COMBINE FORCES

What would prove to be valu-
able acquisitions would be the
purchase of a large rock crusher
by the city of La Grande and a
steam roller by Union county
and interchange the work of
both machines in the construc-
tion of good roads throughout
the county and in the city of La
Grande. Umatilla county has
adopted this plan to improve
her streets and highways and
although no work has been done
it is looked for to be a great
success.

In building road in the
country district it is not at all
likely that all crushed rock roads
could be built but there are
many instances where they
must exist to be passable. The
Booth lane for instance is a
sample of poor winter road.
With a layer of crushed rock
rolled with a heavy roller farm-
ers could haul twice the amounts
they now haul over that stretch
in winter.

The city streets for example,
need not all be crushed rock
either. Where proper grading
has been done to round them up
so the water runs off properly
and after being rolled to a com-
pact surface they are found to
be much superior to the flat un-
drained streets that exist in
every community.

Only a concerted effort on
both the part of the city and
county administrations can ever
accomplish anything in road or
street building. Good roads and
good streets impress a new
comer more than any monument
or ornament that can be shown.

With a big wheat crop, a big
hay crop, a big beet crop, a big
demand for the product of our
thirty saw mills and normal
conditions of the fruit and stock
industries, Union county resi-
dents need not worry with re-
ference to the amount of circu-
lating medium this fall. We
will have plenty of money.

State Senator Geo. C. Brownell
is following his usual custom
and has just made a speech,
whereby he announced himself
as a candidate for reelection.
Heretofore he has been very
successful and as his custom has
been along the theory of the
primary law he may continue to
be a member of the upper house.
