T T Glenn, of Summerville is reported to have threshed 2100 sacks of wheat from 150 acres, and in the same vicinity Simon Woodell got 2150 sacks from a quarter section.

Train number six came through in two sections the traffic being so heavy. The first section was composed wholly of tourist cars. The following section carried the day coaches for the local travel.

The poles have all been set and the wire will be strung next week and the 60 horse power electric motor will commence grinding on the new wheat crop at the Pioneer mill at La Grande City.

On the first of next month the La Grande Creamery will have been in operation its first year, and when the year's books have been balanced the figures will make a splendid showing for both the patrons and the owner.

Wm. Hall, one of the executive committees of Union county for the Lewis and Clark exhibit, today sent a shipment of choice pears, peaches and tomatoes. Our exhibit is now attracting no small amount of attention. There is no section of the west that can excel us in the many sections to which our climate is adapted. Miss Lorena has been devoting some time to story writing of late and has met with success, and will in the future pay more attention to magazine stories in connection with her newspaper work.

At The Courthouse

A marriage license was issued today by County Clerk Gilham to Frank E Stilwell and Victoria Duryea, both of this city.

A mandate from the supreme court showing the Grande Ronde Lumber company \$70 for the expense of an appeal in the case of that company versus J F Alden and allowing a new trial. The case was heard before the circuit court last spring. Mr Alden sued the company for the loss of two horses and was awarded \$400 damages. The Grande Ronde Lumber company appealed with the above results.

Suit was filed today by J D Slater against J F Baker to recover \$105 rent for a certain piece of land situated in this county.

A suit involving 30 plaintiffs and 12 defendants was filed today from Union naming R E Smith, et al as plaintiffs and J Ficklin as defendant. The suit involves the riparian rights to a stream near Union known as Little Creek from which all of the plaintiff and defendants secure water for irrigation.

O H Finn today instituted an equity suit against John Anthony and wife for the possession of Lot 15, Block 98 in Chaplin's addition of the city of La Grande, which it is alleged that the defendants have held wrongful possession since January 1, 1904 and for the possession of which the plaintiff asks \$30 damages.

Another suit brought by O H Finn as plaintiff is against Andrew Larson and his unknown heirs to clear title to Lot 2, block 52 Chaplin's addition to the city of La Grande.

H M Mouson of this city filed suit against F Tietjen and J L Pinkerton of Imbler, to recover the principal and interest of a note for \$306.77 given by the plaintiff on December 10, 1903.

Mrs Mary Kelley was today appointed administratrix of the estate of William Kelley deceased. The estate is valued at \$14,440.
