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PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT RECEIVES MUCH CREDIT FOR BRINGING ABOUT PEACE BETWEEN THE TWO WARRING NATIONS

Messages from Every Civilized Country
Come to Congratulate HimRussia May Have Agreed to Pay Large
Sum in Lieu of Indemnity

Oyster Bay Aug 30.—Telegrams are pouring in to President Roosevelt as fast as the operators can take them, congratulating him upon the conclusion of peace. Emperor Wilhelm and King Edward were among the first to extend greetings, both declaring the President was largely responsible for the successful turn in the peace negotiations.

Portsmouth, Aug 30.—There is a growing suspicion here this morning that Russia will pay Japan a large sum of money for some unknown purpose in lieu of a cash indemnity. Much secrecy is maintained about certain points and it is believed that the indemnity lies concealed in this sum. Traffic arrangements were made yesterday for through service on the Chinese Eastern railroad and such concession to Russia of great commercial value that Russia was naturally willing to pay handsomely for them.

NO MEETING TODAY

Portsmouth Aug 30.—There will be no meeting of the peace conference today. At the time they adjourned yesterday no hour was set for the next meeting.

CONGRATULATING WITTE

Portsmouth, Aug 30.—The telegraph office here has been burdened all night and this morning with messages from all over the world congratulating Witte.

EMPEROR PLEASSED

Portsmouth Aug 30.—Mr Witte was most pleased this morning by a receipt of a message from his Emperor signed Nicholas, conveying in his most cordial terms, his thanks.

DRAFTING TREATY.

Portsmouth, Aug. 30.—No time is being lost by the special councillors of Japan and Russia in drawing up the treaty. Dr. Martens for the Russians and Dennison for Japan. They mapped an outline of their work last night and both were at their desks early this morning with their secretaries preparing a draft of the treaty.

ALSO IN NEW YORK.

New York, Aug. 30.—Wall street heard this morning that both Russia and Japan will float large loans here. The general opinion is that Europe nor America will permit a stringency of the money market as a result of the conclusion of the peace conference. In anticipation of Russia having to pay an indemnity, great sums of money were gathered which will now be used to prevent a possible squeeze.

\$200,000,000 INDEMNITY

London Aug 30.—It is estimated here that Japan has received about \$200,000,000 as a reimbursement for the care of the 80,000 prisoners and railroad section.

MONEY MARKET ADVANCE

London, Aug 30.—All stocks are

advancing as a result of peace being declared. Russian bonds jumped from 3 3/4 points this morning and Japanese bonds advanced from one half a point to two points.

CAREFUL IN SPEECH

Oyster Bay, Aug 30.—Realizing that a mistake might easily upset the delicate situation and spoil all of the peace arrangements which otherwise would be assured, the President is very careful in his statements. It is likely that he will entertain the envoys at Sagamore Hill before they return but to avoid all liabilities of unpleasantness the Russians will be entertained one day and the Japanese the next.

THANK THE PRESIDENT

Oyster Bay, Aug 30.—W J Bryan was among those to offer congratulations to Roosevelt today. Senators, governors, diplomats and sovereigns were also among those who sent congratulatory messages from the world over giving credit to the American President for having brought about peace. The wires are continually bringing thanks or praise.

CONGRATULATE MIKADO.

Oyster Bay, Aug. 30.—In reply to a letter from ambassador Komura, which is not made public, the President sent the following: "Baron Komura, I received your letter and I ask you to convey to the emperor of Japan my warmest congratulations, upon the wisdom and magnanimity he and the Japanese people have displayed and I am sure that all civilized mankind shares this feeling with me."

TWO ARTICLES DONE

Portsmouth Aug 30.—A rough draft of the first two articles of peace were completed today before noon. The completed clauses are:

1 The evacuation of Manchuria by both armies at an early date to be fixed by the commanders in the field.

2 The recognition of Japanese predominance of influence in Korea, politically and commercially. The only restrictions placed upon Japan being that she must not fortify Masampo harbor which commands the straits of Korea. It is understood that the third and fourth articles provide for the territorial integrity of China and the 'open door' in China. There will be no meeting of the envoys until the treaty is ready for their inspection.

MORAL VICTORY FOR JAPAN

St Petersburg August 30.—Prince Onkhthonisky, editor of the St Petersburg Viedomosti, today in speaking of the peace conclusions says it was a diplomatic victory for Russia but it was a great moral victory for Japan.

POPE PLEASSED

Rome, Aug 30.—The pope was informed of the conclusions of the peace conference this morning. He immediately arose, exclaiming, "This is the happiest news of my life. I thank God for President Roosevelt's courage."

Pearce claims that he had a contract for one third of the profits over \$200,000 and that President Sutherland, of the new company worked him out.
