The coming of the cement walks in  
the residence districts of the city is  
followed by the abolishment of the  
fences from around the handsome  
residences. This is one of the first  
steps in the change from a country  
town to a small city and a change  
that should be welcomed. Few  
people imagine the investment in  
fences around city property in La  
Grande. Thousands of dollars are ex-  
pended thus every year and in the  
future money that would have other-  
wise been put in fences will in the  
future be placed in concrete sidewalks.  
The coming of the fenceless yards  
means the exit of the town cow.  
They can no longer be allowed to roam  
the streets promiscuously while the  
herd is blocks away. The rights of  
the citizens must be respected and the  
cows kept up until they are to be  
driven direct to their pastures.

A vinegar factory would have saved  
thousands of bushels of apples that  
were rendered useless by the wind

of the inland empire last week.

The Ingham Vinegar Company will  
have its plant at Medford, Oregon, in  
operation in time to handle all the  
apples which orchardists in that sec-  
tion may wish to sell to it. The ca-  
pacity of the factory will be 600 bar-  
rels per day. The price paid for apples  
will be \$4 per ton.

The farmers of Union county cer-  
tainly have been blessed with ideal  
weather during harvest and they have  
been improving every minute of it. It  
is reported that there are about thirty  
machines working about fourteen  
hours every day.
