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OUR HOME MARKET

Much as we Americans congratulate ourselves upon our foreign trade we will do well to consider that our home market is of far more importance to us than our foreign commerce. Take our manufacturing interest that in 1900 had 512,743 establishments that gave employment to an average of 5,719,137 wage earners and paid them in wages and salaries \$2,735,430,848 a sum greater than the value of our exports and imports for that year by \$2,000,000,000. These manufacturers turned out that year products valued at \$13,039,279,566 of which the home market took \$12,695,437,810 and the foreign market \$433,851,756. That is where the manufacturers sold one dollar's worth of the products of their factories abroad they sold thirty at home.

The records show that in 1900 there were 5,739,637 farms in the United States on which were 10,438,219 persons engaged in agriculture. The total value of all farm products for that year was \$3,764,177,706. The total exports of farm products for 1900 were valued at \$873,322,882 which left \$2,890,854,824 worth of farm produce to be consumed on the farms or sold in the home market.

In the calendar year of 1903 there were 49,464,967 acres in wheat which produced 670,063,008 bushels, in the United States, of this 202,005,598 bushels were exported, and 467,157,410 bushels were left for seed and the home market. Reckoning that 75,000,000 bushels were reserved by the farmers for seed there would yet remain to make bread for our people 392,157,410 bushels of the crop.

Should a change of policy, as to tariff or from any other cause, throw any considerable proportion of the nearly six millions of wage earners from the factories onto the farms, and change them from consumers of farm products to producers thereof, it takes no expert in arithmetic to see that the home market for both labor and farm produce would be thereby strained and most probably be made to yield.

GLOSES CHAPTER

The signing of the peace treaty closes that chapter of the world's history. The lack of pomp and ceremony marked the eventful occasion and from today the two nations will be at peace. Our president has received the greater share of honor in settling the differences as his judgment and far-sightedness did much to bring the two nations together.

Japan alone seems dissatisfied with the terms and it is with difficulty that the people are kept under control to great is their humiliation and chagrin at the concession made. They will time realize the great benefit of the closing of the war and become more reconciled to the decision reached.
