LABOR DAY REFLECTIONS

The yearning of labor, that it re-
ceive appropriate consideration is one
of the most hopeful signs of the times.
It heralds a great uplifting of human
ity. It is based on the modern belief
that this can be made a much pleas-
anter abiding place for man than it
has hitherto been. This belief carries
with it a strong suggestion of added
labor of a kind not heretofore under-
taken by the laboring masses and of
the assumption by the men and wo-
men, who perform the physical labor
necessary to provide food, raiment
and shelter for the human family, of
great and well-deserved responsibility
not heretofore born by them.

To meet the responsibilities, insepa-
rable from labor proper and just
position in the economic world, the
laboring man or woman will have to
do a great deal of brain work, as well
as muscular work. The future laborer
will be in full sympathy with his
work and help plan for the best re-
sults. His mental scope will extend
beyond the mere question of wages,
and it is hoped "the journeyman,"
mechanic will become extinct, and the
laborer having become a potential
factor in his community will become a
permanent resident, and the owner of
the roof that shelters him, and an
interested citizen when plans are be-
ing discussed for future improvements,
having a far deeper interest therein,
than the days he may be employed
in the construction thereof. In the
future we anticipate. Labor will pay
no tribute to land lords for he will be
his own land lord, neither will he con-
tribute the larger portion of his "earn-
ings to the mistress of the boarding
house, because his own sweet wife will
board and lodge him in a home that
belongs to both.

Heads of families will soon begin
purchasing supplies for fall and winter,
and they should remember that every
dollar sent out of the valley goes on a
long journey, and the possibility of it
ever returning is very small. Every
dollar removed from local circulation
reduces the opportunity of a local
man making a dollar. The home
merchant assists to maintain the
public school, the city government
the churches, and in short all that
makes it possible or profitable to live
in the county. Purchasers should not
overlook this fact. Another fact
which should receive proper attention
is that if your home merchant makes
a mistake he is here ready to rectify
the mistake, but the foreign merchant
is only sorry and his grief is expressed
to you through a circular letter which
does not in any way assist you out
of your difficulty.
