DROWNED IN WATER DISCH

Baker City, Sept 8-One of the and-

lest secidents reported in Bake County for some time occurred Tues-day night at Richland, when the two year old baby girl of Mr and Mrs L G Morse wandered away from the house and fell into an irrigating ditch and was drowned. The parents are nearly created with grief over the end event The Morse home is but a short dis tance from the large freigating ditch which waters the land in that vicinity. Tuesday evening the little baby was playing about the house and yard. She must have toddled off toward the distant ditch searching for those things which interest the little ones. No one was near when she crawled over the banks and fell into the water. No cry was heard and no one knew of

the death until long afterwards, When Mrs Morse discovered that the little one was not in the yard she immediately commenced a search. The neighbors were called in and for five bcurs they scoured the immediate vi-cinity and then the dead body was dragged from the ditch.

While here Mr. O'Nell completed the arrangements for the running of a special excursion train to accommodate those desiring to attend the stockmen's convention and poultry show at the Lewis and Clark show at Portland The train will leave Huntington at 5:30 o'clock the morning of the 18th, passing through Baker Ulty about 7:30 and arriving in La Grande about 9:30. It is intimated that many of the larger stockmen and ranchers of Harney, Malbeur, Grant, Wheeler, Union and Umatitle counties will take advantage of this train. The rates are the same as have been made on previous excursion trains, \$8 round trip from La Grande, good for seven days.

Echo Fire.

Sept. 8-Fire broke out in the Miller store shortly after midnight, destroyed \$25,000 worth of property and one man narrowly escaped suffocation.

A clerk employed in the store was sleeping in the building when it caught fire and was nearly overcome by smoke when rescued.
