MURDER CAUGHT IN BAKER CITY

Albert Glassford Killed Wife of Three Weeks in Illinois and Escaped

Wanted for the brutal murder of his bride of three weeks, Albert Glassford, alias Joe Rogers, lies in the county jail awaiting his transportation back to Peoria Illinois, the scene of his crime. Rogers has been held here for the past three weeks pending the arrival of a deputy from Peoria who could identify him, and take him back. The deputy arrived last night and in company with Deputy Snow, were making an examination of Rogers. From pictures and measurements which the Illinois authorities furnished, the identification was almost complete and lacked only a few minor details to make it positive. These few discrepancies will no doubt be removed with a more thorough examination.

The crime for which Rogers is wanted was committed on the 26th of last April, when he shot his wife in their home in Peoria, and immediately disappeared. In 1891 Glassford or Rogers served a term in the penitentiary at Joliet for forgery. He was paroled the following year. He was a heavy drinker, and one day while on a spree with a woman of his acquaintance, the two were married. On coming to their senses they both regretted their rash act, but were compelled to make the best of a bad bargain. The woman was infatuated with another man by the name of McDunn, and he visited the house during Glassford's absence.

Glassford discovered the fact, and on the morning of the 26th he swore out a warrant for McDunn's arrest. Shortly after he went home, and found his wife preparing to leave. He at once presumed that she intended meeting McDunn, and becoming enraged drew a revolver and shot her, killing her instantly. Another woman was in the house at the time and saw the shooting. She ran outside to give the alarm and Glassford fired at her narrowly missing her. The murderer then ran out of the rear door of the house and down to the railroad tracks. A chase was organized soon afterward, but nothing was ever found of him.

Rogers was arrested in Huntington on suspicion of being crazy, and brought to this city for examination. Since his stay here he has about recovered and appears perfectly sane. He is extremely worried, continually walking the floor and threatening to kill himself. He does not eat much, and says that he will never live to be taken back to Illinois. A strict watch is kept over him to see that he does himself no harm. A reward of \$4,000 is offered for Glassford's capture. Suspicion that Rogers was really Glassford was brought about by the examination of pictures which Sheriff Brown had received from the Illinois authorities. The case against Glassford is clear, and means hanging when brought to trial.—Baker City Herald

BOYCOTT BEYOND CONTROL

Theona, Wash., Sept. 8—Various reports of the Chinese boycott against American made goods were brought by the steamship Tremont, which arrived from the orient today. Probably the best posted passenger on the subject was Thomas F. Millard, special correspondent for Scribner's magazine, who has spent much of the past two years studying conditions in the orient.

He declares that the boycott is of a more serious nature than this government is aware. Mr. Millard says: "The boycott is not only working an injury to the United States, but to all foreign countries. At the outset our country was probably the only one affected, but matters have changed. Newspapers owned or subsidized by Germans, French and English for a while poked fun at the boycott, but when it began to hurt their countries a different opinion was expressed. Those firms which handle American made goods also sell products of other countries, and it is impossible for the boycott to damage the trade of one country without seriously affecting that of another. It is even hurting Chinese industries which label their products with American trademarks. When the movement started its promoters never intended to let it go far. Most of the Chinese are of such an ignorant class that when they get started it is like 'giving a bull more rope.'"
