**THE G A R PARADE**

The big parade of the members of the Grand Army of the Republic at its National Encampment in Denver Colorado on the sixth instant had 15,000 ex union soldiers in line. It took the procession three hours to pass a given point. On July first, this year there were 222,455 members in good standing in the 6,931 Grand Army posts in United States, and the net loss in membership of the order for the year was 14,855, presumable from death, a per cent of 6.39 of the whole membership.

There were 2,666,999 Union soldiers in the U S service during the war of the rebellion. There were 280,739 deaths from all causes in the Union armies during that war being 10.52 per cent of the number on the muster rolls. The killed in action or died from wounds received therein were 5,221 commissioned officers and 90,868 enlisted men, a total of 96,089 being 3.68 per cent of the whole force in the service.

The casualties from diseases and accidents during the war were 2,321 commissioned officers and 182,329 enlisted men, a total of 184,650 being 6.84 per cent of the whole force in service.

A significant fact presented by the above figures is that camp diseases killed more of our soldiers during the war than the confederates, nearly two to one. This is remarkable and should receive serious consideration from our citizens, that the government take action to prevent repetition hereof in case of another war. Our men moved and fought in practically the same country and climate in which the men had been grown. The only explanation of the greater loss of men from disease than hostile bullets and sabers is the lack of proper attention to the hygiene of the men, and especially of the enlisted men. The above figures show that 5,221 commissioned officers were killed in battles wherein 90,868 enlisted men lost their lives, and that only 2,321 commissioned officers died from diseases and 182,329 enlisted men died. A little more than twice as many enlisted men died from sickness as were killed by the confederates.

The army ration when properly cooked is nutritious and healthful, but when placed in the hands of raw levies it is about as successful a device as a health destroyer as was ever contrived. We take young men, who have always been used to soft cooked food that others cooked, and warm beds in comfortable homes, and hand them some flour, pork or beef, coffee, beans and salt and tell him to cook and eat. He is drilled for hours each day in the awkward squad until he can right face, beat time, eyes right and left salute the officer and load his musket in twelve times or motions, relieve a guard and take his beat and do numerous other military gyrations but is taught little or nothing of how to cook. A single blanket is given him for a bed and a place is given him to spread his blanket on the ground where if it is cold he shivers the night

through and gets up at reveille, peep-o-day, goes out to drill until breakfast time and then if his chum has cooked a flapjack, sliced some bacon and boiled some coffee in an open camp kettle he has breakfast, if not he fills up on some cold half cooked beans and hard tack and returns to drill. Is it a wonder that our young soldiers sicken and die?

It would certainly be a human act if nothing more to provide cells for city prisoners in the Fire department building. The present quarters are not decent to incarcerate any human creature.
