WILL COST JAPAN

The lack of the power of self control exhibited by a good number of people in Japan, by their riotous conduct on receipt of the news that a treaty had been signed by the accredited diplomats of Japan and Russia, because the terms of peace did not suit them, will cost the people in that country much more than in their haste they comprehended. The cost will not be directly in cash, but in loss of reputa-
tion.

Up to the unfortunate riotous acts referred to, perhaps no people on earth stood higher in the estimation of mankind for patriotism, self control and practical wisdom than the Japanese. This reputation was won by it bravely accepting the challenge to deadly encounter by a warlike nation six times larger in population and resources, and then to the surprise of all, so conducting its naval and land forces as to be the acknowledged victors.

The western people thought at the commencement of the war, the Japanese were novices in modern warships and in the handling thereof, but at its close they learned their mistake, for no warships in modern or ancient times were ever handled better than the little brown men handled and fought their ships.

History cannot cite another instance in any war, where so large an army as Japan raised, equipped, armed, provided for and drilled, was carried over seas to a foreign land and posted in front of equally large land forces of the enemy with such a complete outfit in each and every detail, for arms, ammunition, clothing, food, camp equipments, hospital appliances and transportation, as the Japanese armies had in Manchuria. Students of the art of war, when they came to the chapter on Logistics, "that branch of the military art embracing a detail for moving an supplying armies" can no where find a better or rather as good an example to study as the way Japan moved and led her army in Manchuria.

In a large number of the battles that Caesar, Alexander the Great, Napoleon, Washington, Scott, Taylor, Jackson, McLellan and Grant fought, the men were ragged and hungry, Japan was the first to demonstrate that with proper foresight and attention to details, armies can be moved and active campaigns carried on without the soldiers suffering for food and other supplies.

Had the people of Japan retained their ordinary good sense, self control on receipt of the news of the treaty, the world could see no flaw in the character and aptitude to prevent it from taking and maintaining a lofty position among the great powers on earth, a position no feeble and spasmodic people, whatever skill and virtues they may possess can long hold.

The education of the American citizen is never finished. The primary election law and the Initiative and Referendum are both new subjects that were not mentioned in the school books on Civil Government when the present voters went to school.
