Portland, Sept. 16—The Northern Pacific officials today made public the statement from President Elliot, that the Portland and Seattle railroad, recently organized, was owned jointly by the Northern Pacific and the Great

Northern and that concern would build immediately along the north end of the Columbia from Kennewick, Wash., to Vancouver bridge. The new entrance to Portland will give both the Northern Pacific and the Great Northern a direct route to Portland from the east.

ACCEPT PART OF MONEY

Seattle, Sept. 16.—The American Board of Foreign Missions held devotional services at 9 a m and received the reports of Secretaries Smith and Barton, also an address by Rev. Day of Los Angeles and the reports of the home departments. Addresses by missionaries from the various fields occupied the afternoon session. The Chamber of Commerce entertained the visitors this afternoon after the exercises.

Tomorrow the pulpits of the local churches will be filled by the delegates. Tomorrow the annual sermon will be delivered by the Rev. Joseph Twitchell of Providence, R I. In the morning the Lord's supper will be celebrated and at three in the afternoon the Women's and Children's meetings will be held. A four devotional services conducted by Dr. W J Dawson of London will be held.

Gladden left for Portland to attend the fair and says the fight against "fainted money" though lost in the national board will be carried to the state boards, congregations and individuals. He said before leaving "It's principals will not be downed as long as the world stands." Gladden's splendid appeal before the board yesterday reduced the opposition from 91 to less than 75 among the members of the board. Rockefeller will be formally notified by the board that \$55,000 of the \$100,000 donation which is not tainted will be accepted at once to carry on the educational work in the foreign fields.

The Rev. M A Mathews, pastor of the First Presbyterian church and one of the prominent divines of Washington, in discussing Gladden's turn down by the board said "Gladden is right. Rockefeller is the greatest thief, robber and criminal in America today. Only the most sordid motives could prompt any church to accept his filthy donations."

New Evidence

Portland Sept. 16—The prosecution introduced evidence today showing that the timber claims bought by Williamson and his co-defendants, had only a fraction of the amount of timber alleged existed. Photographs and the testimony of Timber Cruiser Davis Edgar, Anna E Long, L C Perry, C E S Wood and A B NoAlpin substantiated the contention of the government.

Fast Motor Cars

Omaha, Neb., Sept. 16—In just six minutes less than the schedule of the fast overland limited the Union Pacific's second gasoline motor car on a trial trip carrying officials and representatives of Eastern roads, today covered the 38 miles from Valley to Omaha. W. R. McKean, Jr., its builder, was at the throttle. Fifty-two miles an hour was reached in places.

Motor car No. 1 has but four wheels with one truck, while the new car has a double truck, enabling it to turn the sharp curves on the hilly track west of Omaha with perfect safety. This is the first all steel passenger car. Its weight is but 56,000 pounds, as compared with cars on the New York subway of steel construction which weigh 78,000.

The visiting railroad representatives declare the Union Pacific has solved the problem; that the motor car is no longer an experiment.

Car No. 2 will go into service on a Nebraska branch line. Five more are being built.

Indian Drowned

The Dalles Sept. 16—An Indian who had come in from the Warm Springs reservation to fish for Salmon at Collico, fell from the rocks into the river yesterday afternoon and was drowned. Conditions there are such that it was impossible for any assistance to be given the unfortunate man, who was whirled from the sight of his companion. At last accounts the body had not been recovered.

Sight a Wreck

Juneau Sept. 16—The officers of the steamer Excelsior report to the custom officers that they sighted a wrecked schooner near Yakutatge. The name of the schooner is unknown, it presumably being a sealing schooner. Four unidentified bodies were washed ashore and were temporarily buried.

Is Heir To Fortune

Oakland Cal Sept 17—Chief of Police Hodgkins is in receipt of a letter from S A Douglass, dated Grass Valley Ore., to the effect that a certain Walter Douglass is heir to a fortune. The letter informs Douglass that his great grandfather Hampton is dead, and that his estate at Monmouth is left to Walter Douglass and two others of near kin. The information advises Douglass that it would be to his advantage to look into the matter at an early date.

WIFE BEATER BEATEN

Storm in Kansas
