REVOLUTION IN OREGON

The adoption of the initiative and
referendum and the proposed adoption
of the imperative mandate, constitute
a revolution in the form of govern-
ment, far more sweeping than was
effected by the makers of the constitu-
tion of the United States. The latter
substituted an elective for a hereditary
executive; a Senate chosen from an
aristocracy of wealth, for a House of
Lords, composed of a hereditary nobil-
ity. Otherwise there was no great
change in the form of government,
nor in the manner of its administra-
tion. While the people nominally
have had the power to govern them-
selves, practically they have been gov-
erned by the few—fully as much so as
in Britain.

But the theoretical power of the
people in bearing fruit, and in Oregon
is being inaugurated the practical
application of what we have so long
held in theory. The people are learn-
ing to use the power that the politician
has so often told them was theirs.
They are becoming rulers, not in
name only but in fact. When they
will rule wisely, time only can
tell, but if they can not, then let us
abandon the pleasing fiction that has
so long made the American citizen a
king in theory, a slave in actuality.
If popular government is a failure,
let us set up a monarchy; if not, let it
be developed to its fullest extent.
Every citizen who sincerely believes
that the people should exercise the
right of self-government, should sign
the petition for these amendments,
and should vote for them when the
time arrives. It is true that the
changes proposed are among the
most revolutionary that have ever
been attempted to be introduced into
the organic law of any land; but let us
apply in practice what has so long
been taught as correct in theory.
