PENSION MONEY IN DIXIE A Tennessee newspaper, most probably edited by a stay at home who fought on neither side, evidently wishing to review the antipathies that cost so much blood in the sixties, in an editorial trying to make his readers believe that the south is held as a conquered people and receives little or no benefit from being a part of the United States says: "There is hardly a dollar of civil war pension spent in the south."

The answer to this statement is that in 1903 there were 3,766 pensioners in Alabama, 3,409 in Florida, 3,618 in Georgia, 28,508 in Kentucky, 6,402 in Louisiana, 12,914 in Maryland, 4,629 in Mississippi, 52,157 in Missouri, 4,096 in North Carolina, 1,982 in South Carolina, 18,498 in Tennessee, 8,594 in Texas, 9,268 in Virginia and 12,887 in West Virginia making a total number of pensioners in the south of 169,168 to whom were paid in the several states in which they resided the aggregate sum of \$22,991,491.48

In 1904 the pension roll in the south increased and there were that year 182,986 pensioners in the 14 states that went into the rebellion to whom were paid \$25,394,384.74. There were paid out by the United States for pensions in Tennessee last year \$2,813,366.71 a sum more than double that which was expended therein for salaries of the teachers in the common schools of that state. In 1900 Tennessee paid salaries to superintendants and teachers of whom there were 9,484 teachers, the sum of \$1,352,225, and the total expenditures for common schools that year were \$1,811,454. There is more paid in pensions by the U. S. than enough to run her common schools in the south.

IN 1908 Governor Joseph W. Folk of Missouri in a large measure owes his popularity, as does President Roosevelt to his anti-graft policy. Perhaps no man has sprung into public favor so quickly as he and he owes it all to his policy. Attorney Henev now in charge of the land frauds is another example of the anti-graft policy. This is an indication that the public at large is opposed to the looting of the public treasuries and pocketbooks of the citizens to better those whose fortune it has been to be in position to graft. Graft has always existed in all departments of the government and state governments but it has rested with some one with courage and power to unearth the scandals, a man powerful enough that in so doing he will not commit political suicide by disturbing the time honored systems of hoodlums. Governor Folk and President Roosevelt are two men who have had the courage and the power to do this. Should Mr. Roosevelt be persuaded to accept the nomination for another presidential term, he may, in all likelihood, have as an opponent, Governor Folk. It will be a battle between giants but with the great prestige there should be little danger of our present president not being re-elected.
