OUR COMMON SCHOOLS

Oregon expended in 1902 to send her 112,047 children between 5 and 18 years of age to the common schools, \$1,892,327. The great cost we are annually taxed for education of our children makes it the duty of every citizen to pay close attention to the way our public schools are managed

There has been much diversity of opinion what education means but the above is the only one that will justify the state and nation in assuming control of and taxing the people for the support of our schools

There are a great many who believe that to educate means the simple cramming of a child's memory with the matter contained in the text books without any or little effort to develop the other mental faculties

There are others who regard the school room in the light of a penal institution, in which acquiring knowledge is a secondary matter to the observance of order

Such schools cannot possibly turn out good citizens. It may turn out men and women whose cowardice makes them orderly, that is they avoid all clashes and conflicts through fear

Such graduates having had their will power crushed out at school, have no stamina to stand up for the right when they go to the polls to vote, but to avoid trouble follow the lead of the bolder men

Therefore our common schools in which the character of the future citizens will largely be formed should be carefully watched by all patriots lest it be written on the ruins of our republic

GERMAN TARIFF

The Crop Reporter for September in an article on the new German tariff which goes into operation on March 1 next gives the rates that will be charged on the following agricultural products from the United States to Germany after March 1, 1906

Corn, 31 cents per bushel, rye, 42 cents per bushel; wheat 49 cents per bushel, wheat flour \$4 per barrel, dried apples 43 cents per 100 pounds, green apples 27 cents per hundred pounds
