A M Osburn Dead

The Oregonian of Sept 20 says: "A M Osburn who has been a resident of Oregon since 1861, died last night at his home in Montavilla, at the age of 79. A week ago he suffered a stroke of paralysis and has been sinking rapidly since that time. Mr Osburn was born in Meadville, Pa., where he resided up to the time of his coming to Oregon. He engaged in stock raising near Eugene until 1894 when he moved to Fairview, and from there to Montavilla two years later. There are living four sons, George C., of La Grande, and Paul, Guy and W H Osburn, of Fairview, and a daughter, Ruth, who resided with her father at Montavilla.

The funeral services will be held tomorrow at the family home, 29 Hart avenue, Montavilla. They will be conducted by the Masons, of which order Mr Osburn was a member."

Mr G C Osburn has been manager of the telephone company in this city for nearly two years.
