GRANDE RONDE MINES

Another four horse load of supplies left this morning for the big placer mine up Grande Ronde river.

At the present time there are twenty one men employed and preparations are now in progress which are expected to be completed by next spring by the time the river will be running plenty of water, when two shifts will be put on, running day and night which will more than double the present force.

It is the intention to construct a flume from the lake at the head of Grande Ronde river, which is about seven miles above the mine. This will be the means of securing a longer water period than through the ditch as at present.

Two men were injured by the caving in of a bank at the mine day before yesterday. Mr. Bailey was considerably injured in the back and Mr. Morris received an injury in one eye.

Already the new company has made one clean up which was very satisfactory and they will make another before winter sets in.

This mine buys all its supplies from this city and it is certainly sufficient to wonder if it would not be a paying investment for the business men of this city to pay a little more attention to the developing of the mines in this district. Some men who have spent considerable money in ledges that show some very rich ledges maintain that if a mill could be established it would be the means of those properties that are already developed, being worked and undoubtedly many new ledges would be discovered. This mill would cost about \$5000 and if a mill is all that is lacking to develop this section it would be quite an addition to the commercial interests of this city.

SUGAR FACTORIES DEVELOPING IDAHO

Fremont and Blagham counties, lying in the great grain, sugar beet and stock raising section of the upper Snake river valley, busy during the present season advanced with remarkable strides, according to reports sent in by representatives of the Statesman in that section. The development there has been remarkable, adding enormously to the wealth of the state. The future is exceptionally bright, and the prospects are enhanced by the steps that have been taken to extend the Northwestern railroad in Idaho, tapping that section. From all points come reports of bumper grain yields and heavy beet crops.

There are three large sugar beet factories in that section, one at Idaho Falls, one at Sugar City and another at Blackfoot. Manager Mark Austin is authority for the statement that during the present season the factories at Sugar City and Idaho Falls will distribute to the farmers \$800,000. The distribution will amount to considerably over \$1,000,000 when the consumption of the Blackfoot plant is included. The factories will start up about October 1. The average yield is given at 16 tons to the acre. The farmers receive \$4.50 a ton for the beets delivered at the factory or at any station on the railroad. A yield of 16 tons to an acre, therefore, represents a gross earning of \$72 an acre, leaving the farmer nearly \$40 an acre profit. In some instances the yield will fall below the figure given, but in none will the net profit fall below \$20 to \$25 an acre. A farmer can lease his land or any part of it for sugar beet culture and receive \$10 an acre without touching it.

The farmers are all enthusiastic over the sugar beet industry, in marked contrast to the conditions that prevailed earlier. They gladly devote their acreage to it, now the fat checks are falling into their hands. The acreage has almost doubled in a year. There are now 8000 acres in beets. In the Sugar City field and 7000 near Idaho Falls. The factories cost about \$1,000,000 each and the three give employment for four or five months to a small army of men and to a number the year round, so the benefits are not wholly confined to the raising of the beets.

Importing Laborers

O Mizoguchi, the Japanese labor contractor, says that he will bring in about 70 Japs from Portland to care for the beet crop this fall. Yesterday 10 arrived for the Plerog farm east of Island City and this morning 20 passed through for Union where they will work on the Amalgamated Sugar company's farm.
