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WHEAT BREAD EATERS

From a table in the September
number of the Crop Reporter, a
monthly paper published by authority
of the U. S. secretary of agriculture the
following figures showing the per
capita consumption each year of
wheat for food in the several countries
named are taken. In France the
annual consumption of wheat for food
is 7.8 bushels, in Belgium 7.2 in
Great Britain (England Ireland and
Scotland) 5.6 bushels, Switzerland 5.7
bushels. The rate of yearly consumption
of wheat for food in Europe
ranges from 7.8 bushels in France to
2.3 bushels in Portugal.

The consumption of wheat per year,
for food, in the United States is 4.7
bushels. At that rate our people will
eat up 390,000,000 bushels of wheat in
a year. This does not include seed
wheat or wheat used otherwise than
for food. The total of wheat consumed
in the U. S. is 5.81 bushels per capita.

For the five years from and includ-
ing 1899 to 1903 the production of
wheat in the United States aggregated
3,163,305,282 bushels of 60 pounds
each making an average yearly crop
of 632,641,266 bushels. The exports
of wheat for that period aggregated
1,061,981,370 bushels an average for
that period of 212,396,274 bushels
exported a year. Taking these aver-
ages as a basis it will be seen that our
home market took 2,101,223,912
bushels and the foreign market took
but 1,061,981,370 bushels or 33.64 per
cent of the crops produced being not
quite one third of the wheat grown in
the five years under review. It may
be fairly stated that the home market
takes two bushels to one taken by the
foreign market.

Property owners who have low hang-
ing trees lining their sidewalks should
trim them as they are a great annoy-
ance to passersby. Winter will soon
be here and the dripping branches
brushing each pedestrian will be a
source of great annoyance. In many
places not only the tall people are
annoyed but the short ones as well as
often the branches hang but a few
feet above the walk. Trim the trees
and save yourself from being spoken
of in a profane way.

The cement sidewalks and no fence
policy is contagious as often when
one person in a block builds a fine
walk and removes his fence his neigh-
bor sees the great improvement and
follows the example. Those who are
not financially able this year to make
these improvements vow that they
will next year and do all they can to
beautify the city.

Few people stop to figure up what
the payrolls of the different industries
in the city foot up to. The amount
disbursed monthly is a large sum.
The railroad shops lead the list, the
sugar company follows and then
down the line through a list of
planing mills, a laundry, a knitting
mill, an iron foundry, a creamery and
a number of smaller institutions.

industries we have are but an ex-

pay? a starch factory, or a dozen
others that could be named? Within
a short time power enough to supply
a city of ten times our size will be
ready for use and why not have manu-
factures ready to utilize that power
when it is ready?
