### OSTEOPATHY AND ITS OPPOSITE

It was with some surprise that our readers last month read the article by Dr. Rachel Read, telling how Osteopathy has reached Japan and gained strong recognition there. Yet the facts are not, on consideration, at all surprising. Indeed, it would seem much more odd if the clever Yankees of the East, the facts having been once presented to them, failed to appreciate the merits of the system.

For is it not a fact that the great Japanese system of self defense, which has attracted so much attention everywhere in recent years, is based primarily upon the possibilities of harm that lie in pressures exerted at special vital points? The educated Japanese who has been admitted to the deeper knowledge of jiu jitsu, has learned all about these pressures with a view to protecting himself and incapacitating his adversary. His knowledge is chiefly of how to do damage, although the system includes some points on how to resuscitate, by similar methods the man whom he has overcome.

Now Osteopathy simply carries the matter to much finer detail, showing how suffering and disease of vital parts may be caused by even very slight pressures at nerve centers; how the slightest misadjustment of bony parts, the slightest contracture of tissue, may result in disease in the quarter reached by the nerves and vessels suffering from such pressures; and how relief from and cure of disease may be had by finding and correcting such misadjustments. So that with the knowledge of his own system of self defense in his possession, it was an easy matter indeed for the Japanese to grasp and appreciate the truth of the proposition—much easier than for the average American who has never had occasion to learn of the intimate connection between nerve centers and suffering.

In this connection it may be noted that the Saturday Evening Post of July 15 has an interesting bit of pure fiction called "The Pneumogastric Nerve," in which a half breed Jap, with a splendid knowledge of the proper touches, is one of the chief figures. He uses his knowledge criminally at first, and afterward in his own defense, producing some weird results upon the numerous men he overcomes and making strange situations one after the other.
