A LAW ABIDING PEOPLE

In the three trials, in the U S
court at Portland, Oregon of
Congressman Williamson and
his co-defendants out of the
thirty-six jurors who sat in the
cases twenty-eight voted for con-
viction and eight for acquittal.

That is in the three trials 77
7-9 per cent of the jurymen
were for conviction and 22 2-9
per cent voted for acquittal. In
the two trials that resulted in
hung juries of the 24 jurors 16
were for conviction and 8 for
acquittal, or 66 2/3 per cent for
conviction and 33 1/3 per cent
for acquittal. In the last trial
the 12 jurors were unanimous
for conviction.

Taking the jurymen as a
measure of public opinion 77
7-9 per cent of the people of
Oregon stand with the admin-
istration of President Roosevelt
in his efforts to enforce the U
S land laws and punish viola-
tions thereof, and 22 2-9 per
cent are not so fully in sympa-
thy therewith as to be willing
to assist in enforcing the same.

When the great respect for,
and high confidence in which
the people of Oregon have heretofore evinced for the de-
fendants in the case are con-
sidered, this showing is remark-
able and proves without doubt
that the people of Oregon are at
heart a law abiding people and
a law enforcing people. While
all deeply regret that the de-
fendants did that which was
wrong yet no true lover of the
state and its good name can re-
gret that the jury in the last
trial did its duty, though a pain-
ful one.

STANDS FOR THE PEOPLE

Without intentionally mean-
ing to do it, President Roose-
velt has in one sentence shown
where his lies his great popularity
with the American people.
Writing to Senator Heyburn of
Idaho last June and upholding
the government policy in regard
to the establishment of forest
reserves, he said:

"Now, when I can properly
pay heed to political matters I
will do so, but I will not for one
moment consent to sacrifice the
interests of the people as a whole
to the real interests of any in-
dividual or any political fac-
tion."

There is a stinging rebuke
in these words, not only to the
senator to whom they were ad-
dressed, but to that large class of
politicians who use public office
for personal ends. President
Roosevelt had no idea, probably,
at the time he wrote that letter,
that it would have the publicity
now given to it. It was not
written to affect public senti-
ment, nor was its publication
needed to increase esteem for
Mr. Roosevelt. But it is one of

many things that give an in-
sight into the real character of
the president.—Spokane Re-
view.

PRICE OF SCHOOL LAND

Idaho by law fixes the lowest
price that school land, 16th and
36th section in each township,
can be sold in that state is ten
dollars per acre. This is four
times higher than any school
land in Oregon is sold at by the
state. School land in Oregon

the irreducible school fund as
an acre in Idaho and would if
our legislature would so say.
