TWO MILLION MARK

Portland Oct 2—With the two million mark passed and prospects excellent for rolling up another half million before the gates are closed for the last time on the night of October 14, the Lewis and Clark exposition is a financial success. The remarkable attendance demonstrates also that the fair has pleased the people, and that is another source of gratification. It is evident that the enormous attendance could not have been rolled up unless the fair had received frequent testimonials from early visitors.

It is evident now that the fair will be, in point of attendance and in every other respect, the most successful exposition ever held. Comparisons with the records made at the Trans-Mississippi exposition at Omaha, an exposition of about the same magnitude as that now drawing to a close, and which has been generally conceded to have been the most successful of all fairs, show that the exposition will outdo the showing made by the eastern enterprise. This is considered more remarkable when the statement is made that Omaha had a population of 19,000,000 within a day's journey, while there resides within a similar radius of Portland not more than 1,800,000 souls.

In spite of the fact that there are more people in Portland now than at any time since the fair opened, there has been no complaint on account of lack of hotel accommodations, or due to exorbitant charges by landlords. This happy state of affairs, it is certain, will continue right up to the close of the fair, because there is room in Portland for a great many more people than reasonably can be expected. In addition the weather continues to be all that could be desired.

The Lewis and Clark poultry show, the dates for which are October 5th to 12th inclusive, promises to be an exhibition of high quality, and one of general interest. Western fanciers have shown themselves to be heartily in favor of the show, and have entered their choicest birds, while from the east are a number of entries of unusual interest.

Yellow Fever

To 6 p. m. Sept 30th, 3,200 yellow fever patients had been received for treatment in New Orleans. Of these 2,382 were discharged, 588 died and 240 were yet under treatment. The death toll was 18.4 per cent of those treated.

Buys Sheep at Elgin

Mr. O. F. Donohue, the sheep buyer, went to Elgin Saturday morning to bring out 27 double deck cars of sheep to be shipped to Wood Park Ill., to be fattened for the Chicago markets. In buying sheep in this section Mr. Donohue simply purchased options obtained on sheep as far back as December, 1904. The original purchase price of the options were three cents a pound for lambs and he paid a premium on this price, making it perhaps the largest price obtained for lambs ever before.

Mr. Donohue ships these animals to his feeding pen 10 miles from Chicago, and for feed, imports screenings from Canada. The screenings are composed of cockle seed, buckwheat and the small grains of wheat that go through the sieves of the machines. These screenings are supposed to be burned under the Canadian laws but may be brought out for feed. The sheep readily eat this and become fat in a short time. Before turning them on the market the sheep are clipped. Mr. Donohue has contracted his wool for 27 cents a pound in Chicago, which insures him a handsome profit.

In speaking of the markets Mr. Donohue said, "Unlike this section, the meat is all handled through the meat trusts. Independent butchers and packers are unknown. Every sheep is slaughtered in the trusts' plants and the profit shaved off before reaching the retailer. There are a number of smaller packing plants running under separate names from the big plants, but these are owned bodily by the trusts."

Compliments Heney

The federal grand jury, prior to its adjournment, sent a letter to Mr. Heney. The letter was a surprise to the district attorney and is prized by him as showing the appreciation with which he works for the purification of the state land frauds are being received. The letters follows:

"Portland, Sept 30—We wish to congratulate you upon your successful efforts to purge Oregon of the corruption in high places upon which the state has been suffering for years, and to assure you that you have our hearty sympathy in your struggle to bring about better conditions throughout the United States.

"We hope that your satisfaction in a duty well performed will be augmented by further honors at the hands of the people."

Rubber Matting

The O. R. & N. company has decided to supply all of its passenger coaches with rubber matting instead of twine and carpet matting in the aisles, because of the sanitary values of the rubber and to prevent the possibility of carrying disease germs on cars.

The rubber matting is recommended by all health and sanitary boards as being absolutely germ proof and the company has made this valuable change in order to safeguard public health in travel, as much as possible.

During the tourist rush from the east so many people from all conditions and surroundings in life are constantly traveling that the danger of contagion spreading is very great at best and the addition of rubber matting in the aisles will reduce the danger to a minimum.

Creamery Closes

At a meeting of the stockholders of the Summerville Creamery Saturday it was decided to close the creamery at that point. Mr. O. E. Harper, manager of the Blue Mountain Creamery, was there and made an offer for the machinery and agreed to take the cream route. His offer for the machinery was accepted and it was agreed by the stockholders that the directors be given power to receive offers for the equipment.

On Tuesdays and Fridays cream shipments will be made by the former patrons of the Summerville creamery to this city. There are fifteen or twenty who are milking quite a large number of cows and whose product will greatly increase the output of this institution. The cost to the patrons in the vicinity of Summerville for the shipment of their cream will be no more than it was when the Summerville institution took their cream.

Quiet, but Prosperous

Summerville is still on the map. Its citizens are happy and contented, and there is every reason to believe that they are prosperous as well. Why should they be otherwise. Summerville is surrounded by a large section of country which is rich and fertile. Orchards, grain fields, dairies and stock ranches and timber tracts with numerous sawmills, all contribute to the support of Summerville. All it lacks to make it complete is a flour mill and a railroad. The railroad will come, and there are those who think that they can almost hear the hum of the great mill now.

Summerville has the usual equipment of small stores and shops, a water system and electric light plant. This plant is owned and operated by Dr. T. R. Monk, and the entire output of both plants is consumed on the doctor's property. Power for the electric plant is furnished by Willow creek, and is sufficient to light his offices, residence, lawn and the stable. The water plant is also only intended to furnish his own needs.
