Northwest News

James J Hill declares that a union railway station in Spokane is wholly impracticable.

The increase in travel to the Yellowstone park during the season of 1905 was 225 per cent over that of the season of 1904.

The Spokane "publicity committee" has raised \$12,000 of the \$40,000 proposed to be put into advertising material in the east.

The Presbyterian synod of Washington is in session at Hoquiam, in the new Presbyterian church, which is one of the finest on the coast.

A P Callahan, a drawn juror, came into the superior court at Aberdeen, Wash., drunk, and was promptly given a jail sentence by Judge Irwin.

There is a heavy attendance upon the Coquille, Wash., county fair. The display is said to be twice that of any previous exhibit in Stevens county.

Senator Hayburn of Idaho, has sufficiently recovered from an attack of appendicitis to be able to leave Washington for Idaho about October 14.

Recent heavy and protracted gales from the southwest have badly damaged the Gray's harbor jetty works, which were badly deteriorated, on account of government neglect.

Eight business houses burned at Montpelier, Idaho, upon which there was very little insurance. Loss, approximately \$19,000. The fire was started by a fight in a dance hall.

Gilbert Pederson, a sawmill hand at Coeur d'Alene, was run down by a locomotive on the Coeur d'Alene-Spokane branch. He was a Norwegian 40 years old.

Two and one-tenth inches of rain fell at Tacoma October 3 within 12 hours. Gutters and sewers were in adequate and hundreds of basements and cellars were flooded.

The tax rate at Spokane this year is 37 mills, which includes all city, school and special levies. The valuation of all property in Spokane is \$36,336,670 as against \$34,009,594 in 1904.

The 57th annual meeting of the General Association of Congregational Churches and Ministers of Oregon will convene at Forest Grove October 17-19. All the auxiliaries will meet at the same time and place.

General News

Russia is trying to secure loans amounting to \$360,000,000, offering to pay 4 per cent. One-half the amount will be placed in France if possible.

British capitalists will advance \$5,000,000 on a Korean loan secured by railway bonds negotiated by the Japanese sponsors for Korean credit.

Up till 6 p m October 4 there had developed at New Orleans 3072 cases of yellow fever of which 396 resulted fatally, and 210 were under treatment.

It is believed John Mitchell, president of the United Mineworkers, will be appointed commissioner of immigration to succeed Frank P Sargent.

The Omaha city council has been enjoined from granting a long-time gas lease. The people are up in arms and a bitter fight of the Philadelphia type is projected.

The conclusion reached by the International Tuberculosis congress in session at Paris is that principal predisposing causes of consumption are alcoholism, overwork and over-crowding.

In the district surrounding Edna, Texas, 700 men are hunting a negro named Monk Gibson, accused of murder and assaults, but fail to find him. It is believed he has made a successful getaway.
