asked that proceedings be delayed until he had time to introduce in congress some modifications of the land laws that would be favorable to the soldier's applications. There was a large attendance when the Senator was called upon the stand, as it had been whispered around that some evidence of a sensational character would be brought forward.

Yom Kippur

From 8 o'clock last evening until the same hour today the Hebrews will observe the Day of Atonement, or Yom Kippur, as it is known in the Jewish tongue. Yom Kippur, the Hebrew Day of Atonement, was instituted in the old scriptural days and has been observed for thousands of years as a day of fasting and prayer. It is the Sabbath of Sabbaths to the Jews, being one of the most holy of days. It is observed very strictly. Yom Kippur and Roah Hoshona, the Jewish New Year, are the two greatest fast days of the people of that faith.

Yom Kippur is fixed by the Hebrew chronology as the eleventh day after the New Year.

The members of the reform church began to observe Yom Kippur as soon as the stars appear Sunday night and he rites are not concluded until the stars come forth Monday evening. From star time until star time is spent in prayer and fasting. In the reform church they have prayers for two hours Sunday night, then services are held in the temple on Monday morning at 10 o'clock and lasts until night with only a short recess at noon for luncheon. The orthodox Jews have no recess during the day.

If the day is strictly observed, not a drop of water or a morsel of food passes the lips of any Jew during the twenty four hours, but of course not all the members of a church are as strict as the older disciples.

The prayers which are held on this fast day are prayers of forgiveness of sins against God, not against man. It is held that not even God can forgive sins that have been committed against a fellow man, unless the man who suffered through that sin forgives him. A lie which harms no one is, nevertheless a sin, because it is a lie, but it can be forgiven by God. But a lie which harms a fellow being can only be forgiven by God only when forgiven by that fellow being. Yom Kippur is the time when the Jews atone for their sins against God.
