A Butter Talk

From certain sources there has arisen the complaint that Blue Mountain Creamery butter is sold at too high a price in order that our customers may know the causes which bring about the fluctuation in the price of butter we have thought best to offer an explanation. In the first place the price of butter is largely influenced by the fundamental law of commerce, supply and demand. The demand for good butter is great and the supply more or less limited. The city of Portland is the leading butter market in the northwest, and the supply of good butter offered there is not quite equal to the demand, and therefore the creameries of that city are alert to find cream from which to manufacture butter to supply their customers. Three creameries therefore establish the price for cream, and even come to this valley and offer a high price to the dairymen for their buttermilk, in order to keep the Portland creameries from getting the cream, we must offer a price equal to that offered by them. If we pay Portland prices for cream we must also receive Portland prices for our product. If we cannot secure the cream we must close our doors and discontinue business. We leave it to the business men of this city and to our customers if it is not simply a plain business proposition. We fully understand that certain business men in this city would gladly see us wiped off the map in order that they might get the good butter days when the farmer brought his butter to town and traded it for goods out of the store, taking what he could whether it exactly suited or not, but we believe the majority in La Grande are fully alive to the benefits derived from the Blue Mountain Creamery, and will stand by it loyally to the last. Feed 7000 Cattle

Seven thousand head of beef cattle, purchased in nearly every Eastern Oregon county, will be fed by R N Stambald, on his Butte creek alfalfa ranches this season. Delivery of cattle has been made at several interior points and a large proportion of the 7000 head is now at Butte Creek, ready for fattening. The prices paid have averaged \$2.75 for steers and \$2 for cows.
