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THE HOME MARKET

So much is said about our
foreign market and so little
about our home market that
many persons treat questions of
public policy, that effect local or
home markets for the things
they produce for sale, as too
trivial for their consideration.
In this they make a great mis-
take. Measured by the dollars
worth of the product of our
farms, factories, mines, and
mills which the two markets
handle, the local is much the
largest market.

To get some idea of the size
of our home market let us see
what proportions of the products
of our farms are consumed at
home, and how much is export-
ed. In 1900, the census year
the products of all kinds on all
of the farms in the U S were
valued at \$3,764,177,706.
Assuming that the farm prod-
ucts increased at the same rate
from the year 1900 that they did
from 1890 to 1900, the total
value of all the things produced
on the American farms in 1905
would be of the value of \$4,741,-
684,798. For the fiscal year
ending June 30, 1905 the ex-
ports of all farm productions,
animal and vegetable, were of
the value of \$826,690,587.

Showing that the people of
the U S gave a market for
\$3,914,994,211 worth of the pro-
ducts of our farms in 1905, and
those of foreign lands for but
\$826,690,587 worth. That is
where the American farmer sells
one dollar worth to foreign
people our people consume four
dollars and seventy three cents
worth.

After making liberal allow-
ances for food for self and family
and for farm animals and seed
it will appear that the home
market is three times greater
than the foreign one for farm
products.

The suggestion recently made
that steps should be taken to
prevent saloons on Adams ave-
nue has met with a great deal
of favorable comment. There
are few cities anywhere the size
of this city that the saloons are
confined to as limited a territory
as in La Grande and public
policy demands that it should
continue so. There are now
nineteen saloons, these certainly
can supply the demand and as
Adams avenue for years been
prohibited territory it should
remain so strictly.

Our forests furnish this
section one of the surest and
most profitable crops in Union
country and notwithstanding
that at the present time there
are about thirty saw mills con-
verting these big trees into
lumber, compared with the total
yet to be cut we have only just
commenced.
