SWEARS VENDETTA IN OPEN COURT

Detroit, Mich., Oct. 28.—At the declaring of a vendetta in open court at the trial of Fortunato Falconi on the charge of killing Louis Calcester, judge, jurors, attorneys and spectators yesterday caught their breaths in a frightened amazement. Emil Brogi was an unwilling witness for the prosecution.

"I do not want to testify against Fortunato Falconi because it might send him to prison for life," he said before the import of his words was clearly grasped, he rattled on trembling with rage, and with his fingers digging into his palms. "I want him

to go free that I may kill him, that I may be avenged for the murder of my dear friend. When I found Falconi with a smoking revolver in his hand and poor Louis lying dead at his feet, I fell on my knees and kissed my dear friend's lips. I struck the floor with my clenched fists and vowed a vendetta, swore that I would kill the murderer of my friend."

Brogi was finally pacified and obeyed the court's instructions to tell what he knew. At the night of July 15, when Calcester was shot and killed while a crowd of Italian men were indulging in a noisy "stag" dance at a Watson street resort.

Commissioner Here

W J Lackner, one of the commissioners appointed to investigate and report next July on a definite system for the apportionment of state taxes, is in the city. The other members of the board are F W Mulky, Portland, and E B Snabrook of Cook county. The idea is for this board to submit recommendations for the guidance of the legislature in 1907, when it is expected that the system will be changed. Mr. Lackner states that it is quite probable that the commission will recommend a permanent state board with powers to regulate equal values, that is if one county is assessed below standard values, the board will have power to raise such values, irrespective of values made by the county assessors.

LA GRANDE MAKES SPLENDID SHOWING

The postal department at Washington has just completed and made public the receipts of all presidential post-offices in the United States and we herewith submit the list in Oregon which fairly represents the business of the various localities for the year ending June 30th, 1905.

There are three presidential offices in Union county as will be noted Elgin, Union and La Grande. Elgin's gain was \$318. The figures show that Union lost in receipts during the year \$785, and that La Grande gained during the same period \$1545 which is certainly a very creditable increase and places us in the class that entitles us to a free delivery system within the city limits and in comparison with all the other towns in Eastern Oregon the increase in the La Grande post-office exceeds all others with just one possible exception.
