The whole of our foreign trade as a nation is in nearly as bad a predicament as the Pacific states. For the year ending with June 1905 all the shipping sea ports in the United States received 30,983.217 tons of foreign goods of which but 7,-080,624 tons came to us in Armeican ships or not one fourth of our imports.

For the year ending with June 1905 there left our seaports for foreign markets in ocean going ships 31,157,541 tons of the various things we export, of this unount of exports, but 7,203,008 tons went forth to market it ships bearing the American flag while foreign ships carried 23,-954,533 tons of the things we offered for sale in foreigi markets.


