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TREATY WITH GERMANY

Baron Speck von Sternberg, the German ambassador to the United States, sailed from Berlin on Oct 25. He comes to make a new commercial treaty with the United States. The new tariff of Germany which the people of the United States interpret as being largely promoted by a desire to injure the trade of this country with Germany, if carried out without some modification by treaty will virtually stop all exports of bread stuffs and other food stuffs from the United States to Germany. Our government having called the attention of Germany to the way we look at the subject, Germany has sent Baron Speck von Sternberg to, if possible, arrange by treaty some satisfactory basis upon which the trade of the two countries may continue.

The Baron claims that the new tariff that raises the duties on food stuffs from this country was made to protect the farmers of Germany, who with their mode of agriculture, were unable to compete with the far-a products of the United States and to meet this demand of the farmers of Germany, the tariff on our wheat was more than doubled.

The people of the United States when they look over the scheduled rates in the new German tariff can scarcely fail to conclude that the purpose of the changes therein made are to aid Germany in its ambition to become one of the great ocean freight carriers of the world and to also make that country one of the great manufacturing countries.

While to please the farmers the rates on grain was more than doubled, but to encourage flouring mills the rate on flour was raised from 8.30 marks per hundred kilos to 18.75 marks per hundred kilos. A German mark is 23.8 cents and one hundred kilograms make 220 pounds avoirdupois. Raw cotton, wool, hides, in fact all raw material that their factories use, are let into Germany free.

The effect of this German scheme, if it works as intended will give their factories a fair chance, with their cheaper labor than in the United States to compete with our factories in our country, and while so doing will give their ocean ships the job of carrying our cotton, wool, hides and other raw material from the United States to be worked up in German factories and then carried back in their ships. Now if the German statesmen can by joining with the anti-tariff advocates in our country induce congress to let the products of

German factories into the U S their plan will work. But how will it effect the 2,469 cotton and woolen factories in the United States that in 1900 paid out in wages \$158,724,263.
