LA GRANDE PUBLIC SCHOOL

Saturday morning about twenty people including our foot ball team went over to Union and met the team of that place in a hotly contested game of ball. The teams were evenly matched, and just at the close of the second half Union made two points, making the score 2 to 0 in favor of Union. The tackling of Corbett and Bay caused favorable comment, as also did the end runs of Goodnough. One of the noteworthy and much appreciated features of the day's doings was the courteous and genial conduct which the La Grande boys maintained on the entire trip. This was noted and commented upon by strangers whose remarks were overheard. The return game will be played in La Grande in a few weeks. The superintendents of each school were timekeepers and Messrs. Conklin and Kaler acted as referee and umpire. Union used our boys well.

By recent action of the school board after next June promotions will be made only at the close of each year, and not twice per year as is the present custom. This ruling extends from the first primary to the last year of the high school.

A teachers' meeting was held Friday afternoon at which were considered the following subjects: Dr. Harris' "Five Windows of the Soul," and the teaching of Commercial Geography. The latter subject was well handled by Prof. E. M. Snider of the White school. Every teacher was present and the interest was good.

Teachers and janitor in the High School building and the superintendent are pleased to know that within a few days the floors of the entire building will be oiled and thus rendered practically dust proof and germ proof.

Mr. Ivanhoe visited the school one day last week.

An examination in arithmetic was held in the seventh and eighth grades last Friday forenoon. These examinations are held solely as a source of information for the superintendent regarding the progress of the schools, and to determine whether or not pupils are retaining a firm grasp upon things previously taught and which they ought to know. Parents are cautioned in regard to wrong impressions which children carry home regarding this and similar matters. Children in one grade thought they were to be put back if they did not receive 90 per cent in this examination. We did remark in the eighth grade that they ought to make 90 per cent on sixth and seventh grade problems, and that they ought to find them easy instead of some taking nearly half a day. Please verify these things at headquarters, before forming an impression. We want a fair deal. Below is appended a list of the questions.

No. 1. Mr. Mark sold to Mr. Slayton, 5 dozen scythes at \$9 each doz., 16 ploughs at \$10.37 1/2 each, 4 1/2 dozen hoes at \$5.48 each dozen, 564 pounds of chain at .16 1/2 cts., 6 1/2 dozen shovels at \$11.72 each dozen, 120 sets hinges at .55 1/2 cts. each set, 14 gross screws at \$1.62 1/2 each gross. Mr. Slayton sold to Mr. Mark, 10 bbl. of flour at \$7.50, 1470 feet of lumber at \$2 per hun., 20 doors with frames at \$10, 146 bu. of oats at 10 cents. Find how this account stands.

No. 2. Find cost of glazing 6 windows each 8 ft. 3 in. by 5 ft. 4 in. at 75 cts. a sq. ft.

No. 3. How many acres in a square field if the entire distance around is 560 rods.

No. 4. Hall, 46 ft. 6 in., long, 14 ft. 5 in. wide. Find cost to carpet at 25c per sq. ft. if strips run lengthwise and are 4 ft. 6 in. wide.

No. 5. School room, 32 ft. long, 18 ft. wide, and 12 1/2 ft. high. There are 61 pupils. If each pupil can breathe 10 cu. ft. of air per minute in what time will the school breathe as much air as the room contains?

No. 6. Can, 6 in. by 4 in. by 3 in. How many in a box 2 ft. by 1 1/2 ft. by 1 ft.?

No. 7. A bin contains 366 bu. 3 pk. 4 qt. of wheat. How many sacks each holding 2 bu. 3 pk. 2 qt. will be used in emptying the bin into the sacks.

No. 8. If a wagon hold a cu. yd. of earth, how many loads will it take to excavate a reservoir 120 ft. long, 54 ft wide and 9 ft deep?

No. 9. Paid \$5.81 1/4 for rye at 57 1/2 cts. a bu. Sold same at 48 cts a bu. Find gain.

No. 10. Add, eight and one half, three fourth, five and one sixth. Then take away seven and four ninths.

The average standing of the entire eighth grade in the above examination was 42%; B seventh 65%; A seventh 12%. In justice to the teachers in charge of these rooms, let two points be emphasized: first that the work of the teachers in these rooms is meritorious, and is not criticized in this connection, and secondly, that the subjects involved in these problems are not necessarily covered this year by these pupils, but nevertheless are sufficiently easy and practical that they should be able to handle them on sight. The cause of these peculiar standings has been referred to before. The lack of seriousness on the part of the child, for his school work, and an alarming indifference for his future, seem to us to be the chief troubles in this matter. As an evidence that this is the case it must be noted that some in each room scored 100%, some 90%, and some 80%, and these are not necessarily the brightest or quickest to learn. They are the hard workers, the ones who later in life become the leaders in the various departments of human effort. Our aim, then, is to develop more of these leaders. Parents would greatly assist us if they would try the child from time to time in the various subjects he is studying so that he may see the importance of keeping fresh in the practical things which he ought to know. Let the boy or girl make computations connected with the father's business or the mother's shopping, etc. In this way we will be greatly helped in reaching our ideal of high efficiency.

A number of new students are entering both the high school and the grades now. The superintendent's report for October shows the following data: Enrollment 904, last year same month 804. Largest enrollment; 65, Visitors 64. Visits from members of school board; 8. A new teacher will soon be added to the teaching force to relieve the congested conditions in the White school.

Miss Deal and Miss Williams united their rooms last Friday afternoon and held some very pleasing exercises.

Miss Rohan and Miss Breinholt have the banners this month each having had no tardy marks during the month. The large U. S. flags will accordingly be displayed on the walls of their rooms during this month.

The Misses Lottie and Mamie Howard of Lincoln Nebraska have entered the eleventh grade.
