One shoulder-blade may be higher than the other: certain muscles are knotted and hard and bulging; certain others, soft or atrophic; the spines of certain vartebras may protrude in a noteworthy prominence others may seem to be wholly absorbed; and the vertebral column may show all sorts of curves and abnormalisms. A certain proportion of the lateral curvatures are due to a peculiar axis of astigmatism which compelled life-long headtilting with compensatory spinal curva-




