wagon went in. The horses stopped im-
mediately or he would have been killed.

injuries.

600 Sheep Killed

Coyotes broke up a band of Charles
Lister's sheep near where the Silver Lake
road crosses the Central Oregon canal
two miles south of Bend. Monday night
says the Bend Bulletin; and when the
animals were rounded up next day 600
were missing from the band of 2400. A
dozen or so sheep carcasses were found,
but no trace of the others, which must
have been run out on the desert.

Workmen employed on the lateral
flume under construction to convey water
to the experiment farm saw in the dis-
tance a lot of sheep harried by coyotes.
There was some doubt at first whether
coyotes or dogs were chasing the sheep,
but it was finally seen that they were
running in a circle and frequently a sheep
on the rim would be pulled down and
killed. It is presumed that these were
sheep that had been scattered from the
Lister band.

Coyotes are unusually numerous and
bold this fall; stage drivers report the
woods of that locality to be filled with
the yelping of the beasts nightly.—Prin-
ville Review.
