Returns to Old Scenes

Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Tillman expect to leave in a few days for Twin Falls, Idaho, where their daughter, Mrs. James V. Baker, resides. They expect to remain about a year. They will first visit Echo, Umatilla county, where Mr. Tillman spent that memorable winter of 1881 and '2, which has been recorded in history, as the "hard winter." In speaking of this dreary winter Mr. Tillman stated that it was the most gloomy season that he has ever experienced. To add to the terror of the weather, he was the owner of a band of cattle for which no food could be secured, and all that could be done was to watch them slowly die of starvation. Of the entire herd but seven survived. Many of his oxen, the patient team which had brought him across the dusty plains, over the rugged mountains, and through weary miles of sagebrush, which lay between his camping place and his home in Missouri, died for the lack of food and shelter. Mr. Tillman has no fears of losing his means of transportation this time, for the plodding oxen and the great blue wagon have given place to the iron horse and plush Pullman coach.

Ankeny Goes East

Walla Walla, Nov. 24.—United States Senator Levi Ankeny will leave for Washington City to take his seat in the upper house of congress, which convenes December 4. Senator Ankeny said this morning that the coming session of congress will be one of the most important the country has had for many years.

"Many matters of great importance to the country in general and particularly the northwest are to be considered. Among the subjects that are of vital interest will be the railroad rate bill, government control of life insurance, the Panama canal and the San Domingo treaty," said the senator. "Another matter that will interest the people of the northwest will be the irrigation question, which is scheduled to be taken up early in the session."

Senator Ankeny has been mentioned in connection with the chairmanship of the irrigation committee and is generally believed that he will secure the important place.

Must Hang

Boise, Nov. 24.—Rudolph Wetter, the murderer of Christ Long at a placer mining camp on Grouse creek, 12 miles from Resort, on July 19, 1904, in Idaho county, must pay the penalty of his crime on the gallows.

The supreme court late yesterday afternoon handed down a decision affirming the judgment of the district court of Idaho county, where on October 4, 1904, Wetter was found guilty of murder in the first degree and sentenced to be hanged.

Insanity was the defense at the trial of the murderer.

Received Bonus

Salem has granted a franchise to the Automatic Telephone company, requiring a cash bonus of \$10,000 for the privilege and 3 per cent annually of the gross receipts. Work on the system will begin at once.

Grand Master Aaron Jones, in his annual address, urged the support of members in the passage of bills, providing for postal saving banks, pure food law, state aid in improving public highways and anti-trust laws.

The National Grange has voted a pension of \$1200 per year to O. H. Kelly, the founder of the organization.
