SOME SPEEDY GAMES

He was 19 years old and lived in Schenectady, N. Y. Moore was knocked unconscious by a blow on the head while he was carrying the ball and kicking the line. He died about six hours after receiving the injury, from cerebral hemorrhage.

INSTANTLY KILLED

Kokford, Ind., Nov. 25.—Carl Osborn, 18 years old, was instantly killed in a football game between Marshall and Bellmore high schools at Bellmore today. One rib had been broken and driven through his heart.

FATALLY INJURED

Sedalia, Mo., Nov. 26.—Robert Brown, aged 18 years, was fatally injured in a football game today. He is paralyzed from the neck down, and has not spoken since he was hurt.
