UNION THANKSGIVING SERMON YESTERDAY

Delivered By the Rev. H. H. Mower of the Methodist Episcopal Church

There was a splendid attendance at the Union praise service held yesterday forenoon in the Methodist church. Naturally it was largely composed of men, as the Thanksgiving dinners were being prepared by the ladies. The meeting was led by Elder Gillilan who was ably assisted by the pastors of the various churches. It was a free open meeting and the expressions of thanks, voiced the prosperous condition of this vicinity.

THE EVENING SERVICE Rev. H. H. Mower, pastor of the Methodist church delivered the sermon at the Union meeting which was held in the Central church. This service was also well attended.

Rev. Mower took his text from Psalms 116 verse 12. "What shall I render unto the Lord for all his benefits?" he said in part, after reviewing the origin and history of Thanksgiving Day from its inception in 1607.

THE SPIRIT OF THE OCCASION Thanksgiving should inspire our hearts to the doing of better things for God. We have been mindful of ourselves and provided as best we could for our recurring needs. Sometimes we lost more than we gained and, perhaps were disposed to question the wisdom of our Creator in permitting us to suffer loss, never thinking that while in the pursuit of wealth we forgot God. We did not say "What doth God care whether we succeed or not? nor did we seek divine guidance but rushed madly after the coveted prize, thinking our own skill and wisdom would bring us success.

Let us take God into partnership, counting ourselves simply as stewards and co-workers together with God.

We in looking back over the passing year, can say, "Truly the year has been crowned with goodness," the measure of which fills our souls with gladness, be it much or little. If we sow sparingly, can we hope to reap a bountiful harvest. A spoonful of seed to the acre can not bring large returns. Are we careful to consider the times and season when our work can best be done, and do it with alacrity and delight? With two things God is especially pleased—earnestness and cheerfulness. "What thy hand findeth to do, do it with thy might."

Be diligent in business, fervent in spirit, serving the Lord with gladness. Slight nothing that God or man gives you to do, always do your best. Let gratitude swell your heart and tune your lips to constant praise. Count your blessings, distribute alms, pour forth prayers, seize every opportunity to be good and do good. Work while the day lasts for the night cometh. A good day's work should be followed by a good night's rest, so far as earthly toil is concerned, but our work for God carries with it the assurance, "As thy day is so shall thy strength be." Let us not be weary in well doing for in due season we shall reap if we faint not. "And who can tell what the harvest shall be," "Eye hath not seen," etc.

"Be thankful that we have a president who has himself so much of the spirit of Christianity. When two great nations were in a life and death struggle—one for conquest, the other for self preservation—our president, with the influence of the government behind him, challenged these people to a consideration of terms of peace. The challenge was accepted, further slaughter was averted, the armies were withdrawn and the results are large y due to this blessed government of w. c. we are a part."

We should be thankful for a broad minded capable statesman at the head of the government whose heroic stand against corruptions, trusts and monopolists and in favor of the masses has been so marvelously endorsed by the people. "The greed which would use our government and some of its strong forces to serve itself and enslave others meets a foe, who is the champion of righteousness at every turn, in the person of our president."

It is quite fitting to give thanks as this time following so closely the great victory of Nov. 17 for civic righteousness, especially noticeable in Philadelphia and throughout Pennsylvania and Ohio. Thank God for civic purity awakening, for official integrity and for the enforcement of the law, as by Governor Folk, of Missouri. While our people are lenient and merciful, when they become aroused to the fact that grafters and thieves hold official positions for unholy and corrupt ends, they arise in their might, cast out the monsters, put true men in office and enthroned justice again. God reigns, and the kingdom of righteousness is coming. A king in righteousness shall reign is God's own promise. Give thanks for the light that God's book is bringing to minds and hearts in places—the fear of the Lord is the be-

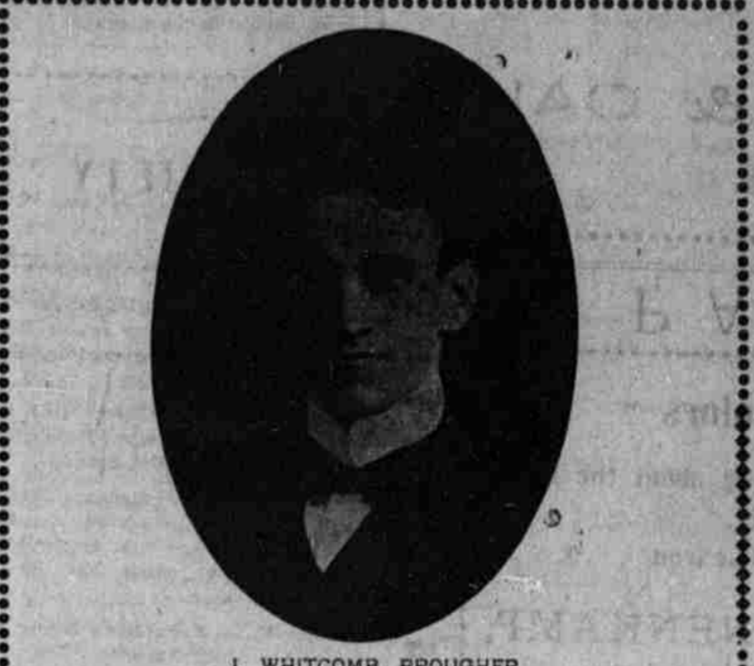
