The city of Colorado Springs, Colo., under the supervision of the Chamber of Commerce, is making arrangements for the centennial celebration of the discovery of Pike's Peak. The celebration will be held next September. This celebration promises to be the greatest event ever held in the state. It is to be a state affair, but the entire nation is expected to join Colorado in honoring the name of the great soldier and explorer, who in 1806 first discovered the peak. The expense of the celebration is to be met by public subscription.

This is good news and the men who have been promoting it are certainly to be congratulated upon their perseverance.
