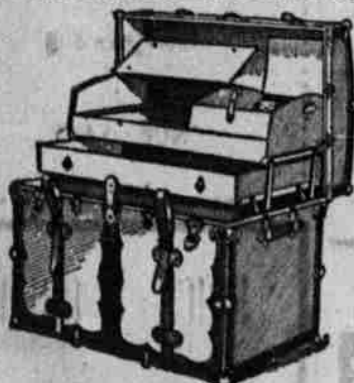

Washington, Dec. 5—Some time during the next six months at Seattle, Washington, a remarkable outfit of machinery will be installed on the cable ship Burnside. The apparatus is designed to dive to the bottom of the ocean even to the depth of 1-2 miles and bring a cable to the surface for repairs. The machinery is now being constructed by a firm in New London, Conn. and will cost about \$25,000.
