20000 Votes For Dr. A. T. Still

An Overwhelming Plurality
Makes Him The American
Candidate For The Nobel
Prize Soon To Be
Awarded In Sweden

This journal takes pleasure in announcing that Dr. Andrew Taylor Still, of Kirksville, Mo., the founder of Osteopathy, has polled a remarkable vote in the recent test made by The Independent, of New York, which ranks as one of the leaders among our more thoughtful magazines. The Independent was so impressed by the more than 20,000 votes cast for Dr. Still that it came to the conclusion that Osteopathy, never hitherto discussed by the large magazine because of prejudice, should have a hearing. Dr. Still himself was persuaded to furnish an article on "The Principles of Osteopathy." It appeared in The Independent of November 9th, and a large part of it is reprinted in the pages immediately following. It was replied to one week later by James J. Walsh, M. D., Ph. D., of the New York Polyclinic School for Graduates in Medicine. Dr. Walsh's arguments are reviewed in this issue in the article entitled "Criticism Soon Confounded." For the benefit of those not familiar with the test made by The Independent, we quote its own note introductory to Dr. Still's contribution:

Details Of The Contest

"Nine months ago we called attention to the fact that no American has yet received one of the five prizes of \$40,000 each, which are annually awarded by the Nobel Foundation of Sweden to the men who have made the most important discoveries in chemistry, physics, physiology

and medicine; have produced the most distinguished work in idealistic literature, and have done most to promote peace. This naturally raised the interesting question whether we have in this country men sufficiently great to rank with the twenty-four Europeans who have received these awards, and we asked our readers to nominate those among our American scientists, authors and peace-makers whom they considered most worthy of this honor."

Other Candidates "Snowed Under"

The Independent notes further that votes poured in so fast for Dr. Still, the American most deserving of the Nobel prize for discoveries in physiology and medicine, that all the other candidates were soon "snowed under."

In its issue of November 23d The Independent finally announced the vote, showing that the enthusiastic friends of Osteopathy had sent in more than 20,000 votes for the candidate. The number received by each of the other candidates in the field of physiology and medicine was absolutely insignificant in comparison; and the vote of Dr. Still was also vastly in excess of that received by any other candidate for any of the other prizes.

Dr. Still, America's Choice

Dr. Still will therefore be recommended as the American candidate for the Nobel prize; and if all of the enthusiastic people who have been cured by Osteopathy could tell their stories he would undoubtedly get it.

There is a spirit of liberality in Sweden, too, which augurs well for the American candidate; but as the Stockholm Commission is of course not free from prejudices natural to long years of traditional medicine giving; and if it awards the prize to Dr. Still, will give signal proof of its ability to throw prejudices aside and recognize the new that is more worthy than the old.—The Right Way.
