IRRIGATION BY THE UNITED STATES

After much bother with large land holders in the region proposed to be irrigated by the United States government along the Umatilla river, Secretary Hitchcock has concluded a satisfactory arrangement with them. This impediment having been removed, active work will be commenced, to carry on which the secretary has apportioned one million dollars for immediate use.

A similar agreement has been made with the large land owners in the region that will be watered by the proposed irrigation works in Klamath county, Oregon and Secretary Hitchcock has apportioned two million dollars to carry on the work there.

The efforts of the government to put in extensive irrigation works on the Malheur river, in Oregon, has been indefinitely postponed because the Dalles Military Road company, that owns a great deal of land under the proposed ditches will not consent to the terms laid down in the acts of congress appropriating money to irrigate arid lands and other land owners standing in with the road company in their efforts to make the government furnish water to tracts larger than 160 acres. These large land

owners set up a great howl against Secretary Hitchcock because he will not use public money unlawfully to make them rich by granting the land grabbers more favorable terms than the laws permits, or that are given to small land holders of 160 acres each. Hitchcock is a very unpopular man with land grabbers.

AMERICAN SHIPS

While the United States ranks high among commercial nations of the world, nearly all the goods it imports and products that it exports are carried in foreign ships. There are now twenty ships at the wharves of Portland, Oregon, with a total tonnage of 36,816, loading grain for foreign parts. In addition to the 20 ships at Portland there are now en route for Portland twenty eight ships with a tonnage of 47,261.

Not one of these 48 ships carries the flag of the United States. Eighteen carry the French flag and twenty three the English. It is estimated that we pay \$200,000,000 yearly to foreign ships in freight for carrying off the things we sell and back those we purchase from other nations. Should a great war break out between any two of the nations that are now furnishing ships for our foreign trade, the consequences would be neither pleasant nor profitable to us, to hear about our cargoes on foreign ships being captured and sold as prizes.

Senator Mitchell in resigning from the chairmanship of the canal committee stated: "I came to the conclusion that as I could take no part in the work of the committee, I had better resign." The same logical conclusion should cause him to hand in his resignation as senator.

James Harvey Graham, a mining man of Baker City, has announced his candidacy on the Democratic ticket in this district for congress. It is doubtful if he will have opposition within his party.

The city council is to be commended in their determination to re-organize the fire department of this city. The usual way would be to wait until we suffered a \$100,000 fire and then take some action

It is evident that the timber and stone act, under which all of the timber land holdings have been secured, will be repealed at this session of congress and some other provision made for the purchase of lands of this character.
