LA GRANDE PUBLIC SCHOOL

The High School students are much indebted to Miss Swan for the donation of The Outlook to the high school reading table. This is one of the best magazines extant and bespeaks Miss Swan's excellent taste in the line of magazines.

Mr. Williams has taken up the matter of basket ball with the high school boys, and a team has already been organized. It is understood that two other teams will be organized in the city and a series of games may be expected in the future which will furnish ample amusement for those possessing athletic tastes.

The next teacher's meeting will occur on the afternoon of Friday, December 22. Misses Rubin, Kahn and Goodrough will have charge of the meeting.

The High-School Literary Society met last Friday afternoon and listened to a very excellent program. Miss Julia Carbin gave the current news, Miss McCall an excellent impromptu, and Henry Heidebreich, an address on Yellowstone Park. The musical numbers were unusually good and consisted of a vocal solo by Miss Schuffel and a concert solo by Vera Hendricks. Both performers showed careful and thorough preparation.

Misses Winder and Ralston, also Messrs. Allstott and Zurbick were among the guests at the session of the Literary Society Friday afternoon.

There were added to the High School library during the past week, without cost to the school board or district, thirty three volumes of history by standard authors. Among these are Mommsen's Germany, Julian Hawthorne's United States and others equally as meritorious.

Miss Borey of the senior class has been much missed by both students and teachers during the past week or two.

Final examinations will occupy a part of the week beginning January 15. The first term or half year closes January 19 and the second term opens the following Monday.

It will be a source of pleasure to many in this city to learn that an opportunity will soon be given to hear the Glee Club of the Oregon State University. This happy function will occur on Thursday evening, December 21.

This club is reported to be unusually good this year. At Portland the singers were greeted by a \$1000 audience, and standing room was at a premium.

Mrs. Bolton and Ingalls favored the school with a visit last Wednesday.

The football season having closed, we have lost one or two students from our high school.

The last vacant room in the White School is now fitted up, and is occupied by a section of the fourth grade, with Mrs. Schilke in charge.

The December examination in general information will occur some time next week. There will be sixty questions, for the most part made up from the three preceding lists.

Five boys, three of whom are in fact, too well known in school circles and in the office of the superintendent, were apprehended by one of our leading merchants in the act of stealing from the store. They were reported to us with the hope that something might be done by way of suggestion or special effort to reach and save them for something better. The boys were turned over to the police authorities, after being caught "red-handed," and taken to their several homes, and turned over to their parents. The smallest of these boys was searched just the other day and exhibited a liberal supply of tobacco and cigarette papers which he stated were for himself and smaller brother who is in the second grade. He stated that he had bought the tobacco in one of the stores in town. It would be a good thing if someone would make a move to place these boys where they belong, as there is ample evidence to warrant their being placed under the subordination provided for by the state.

Our basket ball girls are planning to play a game with Baker City in the near future, in this city. A return game with Pendleton will also be played soon.

The Island City foot ball boys played a game Saturday with the La Grande second team, which resulted in a tie of 0 to 0. This tie is expected to be played off later.
