The first train into Moscow was fired upon by the strikers. The engineers and many passengers were wounded. The inhabitants of this city are collecting supplies preparatory to a siege. The Bourse is panicky today. A general strike has begun in Moscow. All of the railroads are involved.

MORE SLAUGHTER

Berlin, Dec. 20.-Additional reports from Tukum say that the troops killed 600 peasants. The rabels killed 35 or 40 dragoons who were defending the town before reinforcements arrived. It is said that many workmen at St. Petersburg oppose a general strike.
