SPRING BROOK DAIRY AN IDEAL MILK FARM

Pure, Clean Milk, the First Item to be Considered. Quality, not Quantity, the Motto.

"Spring Brook Dairy" is the name that J. W. McAllister has given to the dairy which has made La Grande famous throughout the world of Jerseys. The name was given because of the presence of scores of bubbling springs which break through the ground on the property surrounding the farm, and furnish clear and cool water in sufficient quantities for all purposes. In fact these springs furnish water sufficient to form a small lake

which Mr. McAllister has stocked with fish and now finds pleasure and profit from its waters. Mr. McAllister has made the dairy business a profound study for a number of years and his well planned stables, highly bred herd, and modern equipment throughout but bears evidence to the fact that Spring Brook Dairy is not the result of haphazard methods. Yesterday an Observer reporter visited the dairy and was permitted to wander over the premises at will to discover for himself exactly how the business of milk making was conducted. He found that the herd consisted of thirty Jersey cows, all comfortably housed in a substantial stable which covers a ground space of 2400 square feet. Each cow is provided with a separate stall in which she is fastened. Though confined to her own stall she is not tied and has complete freedom of movement. In this stall she is retained only a part of the day, the greater portion of the day when the weather will permit, the cows are allowed to range over the alfalfa pastures through which numerous little brooklets find their way from the springs to the lake. The stable is so arranged that all the filth and litter falls in the center of

the barn, in gutters provided for the purpose, and is taken away each morning and hauled to the fields. Each cow is as carefully groomed as a driving horse and just prior to milking time their flanks and udders are sponged off with damp cloths. By this means all possibility of dust or dirt falling into the milk is prevented. As soon as the bucket is filled the milk is taken to the separator room where it is first passed through a strainer and then through the separator. The separator has the double effect of removing all foreign matter from the milk and also drives out the animal heat.

The spouts of the separator are set to completely mix the milk and cream as the process of separating is carried on. From the separator the milk is placed in the bottles, which as soon as full are hermetically sealed. The milk is then ready for delivery to the customer. In order to supply the trade with individual bottles over five hundred bottles are required. These bottles are washed and scalded each day. The greatest care is given throughout the entire dairy to secure absolute cleanliness. Only the best and purest feed is supplied the cattle, the

very best possible care is taken of the cows, every precaution taken to keep the herd in a healthy condition, and every care and attention given the milk from the time it is taken from the cow to the time it is delivered to the customer.

A visit to Spring Brook Dairy will convince one that the milk is pure and wholesome. By actual test the milk as received from the entire herd is better than five per cent milk.

MILK TALK No. 1. CHEAP MILK OR MILK

Are you buying your milk cheap or are you getting cheap milk? That is the question which every consumer should consider before buying. There are five properties contained in milk, viz: ash, or bone material, casein or curd, butterfat, sugar, and water, in proportion of 5 of 1% ash, 3.5% casein, 4% butterfat, 5% sugar, 87% water. Now there are 15% solids and 87% water in a 4% milk, that is in milk containing 4% butterfat. This ratio holds good whether of a high or low test, i. e. if you have a milk testing 5% the other solids will be increased in proportion, if a 5% they will decrease in like manner. Now the solids are what is, or what should be considered in buying milk, as the water can be had for the pumping. Now let us consider for a moment before we buy whether we are paying a high or low price for these solids. A 3% milk contains 9.75% solids and 90.25% water, a 5% milk contains 16.25% solids and 83.75% water. Now if a 3% milk is worth \$1.50 per quart per month, what should a 5% sell for? Let's see, if we pay \$1.50 for milk containing 9.75% solids, at the same price milk containing 16.25% solids should sell for \$2.50, or you can to every three quarts of 3% milk add two quarts of water, making 5 quarts of 3% milk, i. e. three quarts of 3% milk is equal to five quarts of 5% milk, at the present price 3 quarts of 3% milk @ \$1.50 = \$7.50; three quarts of 5% milk @ \$2.00 = \$6.00, i. e. you are getting the same amount of solids for \$6.00 in a 5% milk that you get in a 3% milk for \$7.50.
