DR. OSLER ON DRUGGING
Continued
SELECTED OPINIONS BY DISTINGUISHED PHYSICIAN ON THE MERITS OF MEDICATION IN DIFFERENT DISEASES

Yellow Fever.—Bleeding has long since been abandoned. Neither emetics nor purgatives are now employed. The fever is best treated by hydrotherapy (water). We have no drug which can be depended upon to check hemorrhages.

Tuberculosis.—The cure of tuberculosis is a question of nutrition; digestion and assimilation control the situation. No medical agents have any special or peculiar action upon tuberculous processes.

Chronic Rheumatism.—Internal remedies are of little service.

Diabetes (Mellitus).—Medical treatment; this is the most unsatisfactory, and no one drug appears to have a direct curative influence.

Appendicitis.—There is no medical treatment of appendicitis. There are remedies which will allay the pain, but there are none capable in any way of controlling the course of the disease.

The Cirrhoses of the Liver.—So far as we have any knowledge, no remedies at our disposal can alter or remove the electrical connective tissue which constitutes the material pecans in ordinary cirrhoses.

Chronic Bronchitis.—Cure is seldom effected by medicinal remedies.

Chronic Interstitial Pneumonia.—Nothing can be done for the condition itself.

Exophthalmic Goitre.—Medicinal measures are notoriously uncertain.

Paralysis.—The disease is incurable. I have never seen the slightest benefit from drugs or electricity. Probably the most useful means is systematic massage, particular in the spastic cases.

Spinal Meningitis.—There are no remedies which in any way control the course of acute meningitis.

Sciatica.—Antipyrin, antiferbrin and quinine are of doubtful benefit. Electricity is an uncertain remedy.

Sick Headache—Migraine.—It must be confessed that in a very large proportion of the cases the headaches recur in spite of all we can do.

Neurasthenia.—Treatment by drugs should be avoided as much as possible.

The family physician is often responsible for the development of a drug habit. I have been repeatedly shocked by the loose careless way in which physicians inject morphine for a simple headache or a mild neuralgia.

Pericarditis.—The patient should have absolute quiet, mentally and bodily, so as to reduce to a minimum the heart's action. Drugs given for this purpose, such as acconite or digitalis, are of doubtful utility.

Endocarditis.—We know no measures by which in rheumatism, chorea, or the eruptive fevers the onset of endocarditis can be prevented.

Valvular Heart Disease (Stage of Compensation).—Medicinal treatment at this period is not necessary, and is often hurtful. A very common error is to administer cardiac drugs, such as digitalis, on the discovery of a murmur of hypertrophy.

Acute Bright's Disease.—No remedies, as far as known, control directly the changes which are going on in the kidneys.—The Right Way.

NOTICE TO TRESPASSERS.
We, the undersigned owners and occupiers of land in Union county, state of Oregon, in the vicinity of La Grande and Island City, Oregon, hereby agree with each other that from and after the date hereof, the signers of this instrument will not allow or permit any hunting or shooting upon or from his lands in Union county, Oregon, lying in the vicinity of Island City and La Grande, Oregon, except under a written permission, which written permission shall be signed by some one of the persons signing this instrument who shall be selected by a majority of the parties signing and denominated secretary of this association.

It is also agreed by and between the signers hereto that in case either or any of the parties signing this agreement shall desire to give a written permission to any person or persons to hunt upon his lands, he shall direct the secretary of this association to issue a written permission to such person for such time as shall be directed by the person asking such permit, and describing the lands upon which hunting or shooting is allowed.

It is also further agreed that no member of this association shall in any case have authority to grant any permit for hunting except upon his own lands, and it is further agreed that each of the members signing this instrument shall, if he sees fit, have the right to make a complaint against and prosecute any person hunting upon any lands belonging to or occupied by any of the parties signing this instrument, and shall also have the right to notify any and all persons hunting or shooting upon any of the lands belonging to or in possession of any of the parties to desist from such hunting or shooting, or to leave such premises.

It is also further agreed by and between the parties signing this instrument that each and all thereof shall do all things which may be reasonable in order to prevent all persons from hunting or trespassing upon any of the lands owned or in possession of the signers thereof without written permission from the owners or persons in possession during the continuance in force of this agreement.

It is also agreed by and between the parties signing this instrument that in consideration of the agreements herein made, each and all of the parties signing this instrument do hereby lease unto the persons signing this instrument for the term specified in this agreement, or until the same shall be abrogated, as herein provided, the hunting privileges upon all the lands owned by the respective parties hereto, and the right to go upon such lands and hunt and take wild game.

It is agreed by and between the parties hereto that this agreement can be abrogated and cancelled as to any separate person signing the same upon his giving a written notice of ten days to the secretary of this association to be hereafter selected.

It is further agreed by and between the parties hereto that any portion of fines paid to each and all persons signing this instrument, if any, shall be held by this association for the purpose of paying any expenses in enforcing the laws of the state regarding hunting and trespassing upon any of the lands covered by this agreement.

MILK TALK No. 1.
CHEAP MILK OR MILK CHEAP, WHICH?
Are you buying your milk cheap or are you getting cheap milk? That is the question which every consumer should consider before buying. There are five properties contained in milk, viz: ash, or bone material, casein or curd, butterfat, sugar, and water; in proportion of 3 of 1% ash, 3.5% casein, 4% butterfat, 5% sugar, 82% water. Now there are 13% solids and 87% water in a 4% milk, that is in milk containing 4% butterfat. This ratio holds good whether of a high or low test, i.e. if you have a milk testing 5% the other solids will be increased in proportion; if a 3% they will decrease in like manner. Now the solids are what is, or what should be considered in buying milk, as the water can be had for the pumping. Now let us consider for a moment before we buy whether we are paying a high or low price for these solids. A 5% milk contains 9.75% solids and 90.25% water, a 4% milk contains 16.25% solids and 83.75% water. Now if a 3% milk is worth \$1.50 per quart per month, what should a 4% sell for? Let's see, if we pay \$1.50 for milk containing 9.75% solids, at the same price milk containing 16.25% solids should sell for \$2.50, or you can get every three quarts of 4% milk add two quarts of water, making 5 quarts of 3% milk, i.e. three quarts of 5% milk is equal to five quarts of 3% milk, at the present price 5 quarts of 3% milk @ \$1.50 = \$7.50; three quarts of 5% milk @ \$2.00 = \$6.00, i.e. you are getting the same amount of solids for \$6.00 in a 5% milk that you get in a 3% milk for \$7.50. Are you getting your milk cheap or are you getting cheap milk, which?
