COVE, OREGON'S MOST PROSPEROUS COMMUNITY

Though much has been said and written regarding Cove, the impression is general that the fruit industry is the sole support of that prosperous little community. This is a mistake. It is true that the fruit industry might be termed the leading industry but Cove has other resources which contribute largely to its wealth and prosperity. To the casual observer the stock business would seem to take an important place and upon investigation it is soon discovered that the cattle and dairy industry stands a close second to the fruit business. The surrounding Cove furnish unequaled past-

urage and the enterprising citizens have not allowed this important fact to pass unnoticed. As a result the fields are dotted with cattle. The Cove cattle man has not been contented with the ordinary range stock but has spared neither expense nor trouble to improve his herd. Many have made a specialty of the dairy business and Cove butter and cheese have enjoyed a wide and enviable reputation. As an auxiliary to the stock business hay raising has become a valuable feature and many fine alfalfa fields yearly yield their rich harvest and thereby enrich the common wealth. Each Cove farm is a combination of wealth producing industries, therefore such a thing as a complete failure is impossible. The frost may harvest the apple crop but it is hardly likely to injure the alfalfa, and though a heavy rain may destroy the cherry crop the strawberry patch is ready to give up its wealth and the proprietor hardly feels the loss. The hills surrounding Cove are well timbered and the lumber industry also contributes its

share to the common good. A short visit only required to convince the stranger that Cove people are prosperous and contented. The homes are almost without exception well kept up. The buildings well painted the fences neat and substantial the barns filled to bursting with the bountiful harvest. While the name of Cove has been given to a considerable region it is officially recorded as the name of the town. And of the town proper more than a passing mention should be made. In order to make the town of Cove, the central portion of the mountain cove, was selected and by spec-

ial act granted a charter and thereby made a municipality with a set of officers complete from mayor to pound master.

The town of Cove bears every evidence of being surrounded by a prosperous community. It is well supplied with churches and schools. The public school building is a splendid two story structure and in it are employed six teachers. Several neat and substantial church buildings demonstrate to the world that Cove people are willing to contribute of their worldly goods in order that their spiritual welfare may receive proper attention. The mechanical industries are well represented. A first class flouring mill adds its busy rumble to the general song of prosperity and a saw mill adds its active whistle to the joyful sound of industry, and several small shops and mills contribute to the wealth of Cove. The streets are lighted with electricity and the entire place is surrounded with an atmosphere of well being.

SQUAWS FOR REFORM

New York, Jan. 22.—Speaking as a loyal Christian, and at the same time as a Sioux, steeped in the traditions and ideals of his race, Dr. Charles A. Eastman made a passionate plea to the Presbyterian Woman's Board of Home Missions yesterday to respect the natural spirituality and conscientiousness of the Sioux women in their efforts to Christianize the tribe, and to utilize them.
"She's already converted," he told a roomful of men and women, largely missionaries, "only she looks through a different glass from you."

**MILK TALK No. 1.
CHEAP MILK OR MILK CHEAP, WHICH?**

Are you buying your milk cheap or are you getting cheap milk? That is the question which every consumer should consider before buying. There are five properties contained in milk, viz: ash, or bone material, casein, or curd, butters, fat, sugar, and water, in proportion of 3 of 1% ash, 3.3% casein, 4% butterfat, 5% sugar, 87% water. Now there are 13% solids and 87% water in a 4% milk that is in milk containing 4% butterfat. This ratio holds good whether of a high or low test, i. e. if you have a milk testing 5% the other solids will be increased in proportion, if a 3% they will decrease in like manner. Now the solids are what is, or what should be considered in buying milk, as the water can be had for a moment, before we buy, whereas we are paying a high or low price for these solids. A 3% milk contains 9.75% solids and 90.25% water, a 5% milk contains 10.25% solids and 89.75% water. Now if a 3% milk is worth \$1.50 per quart per month, what should a 5% sell for? Let's see, if we pay \$1.50 for milk containing 9.75% solids, at the same price milk containing 16.25% solids should sell for \$2.50, or you can buy every three quarts of 5% milk and two quarts of 3% milk, i. e. three quarts of 5% milk is equal to five quarts of 3% milk, at the present price 6 quarts of 3% milk @ \$1.50=\$7.50; three quarts of 5% milk @ \$2.00=\$6.00, i. e. you are getting the same amount of solids for \$6.00 in a 5% milk that you get in a 3% milk for \$7.50. Are you getting your milk cheap or are you getting cheap milk, which?
