EASTERN OREGON GOVERNOR

One of the state's distinguished and most able men aspires to the highest office in the state, the governorship. As to his ability to fill the position to the credit of the state and to himself and also in a manner that will prove eminently satisfactory to all, no doubt has ever been expressed, in truth this highly important fact has been conceded, says the Sumpter American.

Baker City has the honor of numbering this gentleman, Hon. Charles A. Johns, amongst its citizens, most of whom would like to see the honor conferred upon their co-laborer, but they overlook one very important fact, and that is telling the rest of the state of the high esteem in which they hold him and of their sincerity in the candidacy.

As in other things, success in securing a nomination or being elected depends to a great extent on co-operation and the success of Mr. Johns' candidacy depends to a large extent on the sentiment in his favor throughout Eastern Oregon. Therefore it seems to the American that Baker City, the home of the gentleman, and in the advancement and progress of which he rendered most excellent services, should take the initiative in the matter.

While the newspapers of that city have published quite a number of articles complimentary to Mr. Johns, their publishers must admit that they will not have the effect throughout the balance of the state that some more convincing method of expressing their confidence in his ability and sincere interest in his candidacy would.

If Eastern Oregon will act in unison in this matter it is almost certain that Western and Southern Oregon will fall in line for Mr. Johns and with what support he can secure in Multnomah county, this section of Oregon will have the honor of one of its favorites occupying the gubernatorial office.

But to attain the desideratum concerted action must be taken at once and the American suggests that Baker City prepare a resolution endorsing the candidacy of Mr. Johns for the office, which we understand is almost unanimous in the city.

With this resolution as the nucleus others can be circulated throughout Eastern Oregon and we have no doubt with the endorsement of Baker City, and Baker county as the lead, such a showing would be made that the balance of the state would be convinced that for once Eastern Oregon has a candidate that carries its entire strength, and in this way give notice to the rest of the state west of the Cascades that the entire section east of the Cascades has a nominee in which it had absolute confidence and its desire to be given just and due recognition.

The expense attached to such proceedings would be very small and we do not doubt at all if the campaign of Mr. Johns was in the hands of a political manager this suggestion would be acted upon at once, as none can deny the powerful influence of public endorsement.

How ever it can be said to his credit this campaign is entirely removed from the domain of politics and he is seeking the office in a clean, dignified manner, asking the support of the people on his record as a citizen and statesman, therefore the duty of such action rests with the citizens of Baker county with the initiative to be taken in Baker City.

Following his suggestion, the American pertinently asks, Will Baker City do its duty? Will it strengthen the chance of Eastern Oregon to have one of its citizens occupy the governor's chair by proclaiming to the rest of the state its confidence in Hon. Charles A. Johns and its sincerity in his candidacy.

It is safe to say that if Baker City will take the initiative in this matter other portions of Eastern Oregon will record their favor of his candidacy and so many will be found to favor him for the office that his receiving the nomination will be assured. After that it remains for the Republican voters of the state of Oregon to say whether they wish one of their party to occupy the highest office in the state and place Old Oregon again in the Republican ranks.

TRY IT ON THE DOG

Philadelphia, Pa., January 22.—One of the most interesting and peculiar exhibitions ever held in this city is that of the Pennsylvania branch of the International Stewards' Association, which was opened today at Horticultural Hall. The principal object of the exhibition is to show to the public what dangers there are in impure foods. To demonstrate the injurious effects of such impure foods, dogs and other animals will be fed with these impure foods, showing from day to day the deleterious effects of such diet. The exhibit shown at the St. Louis Exposition has been secured with the dogs shown under the direction of Professor Eugene Girard. Especial attention will be paid to the various acids, drugs and poisonous dyes used for purposes of adulteration. The exhibition is part of a campaign of the Stewards' Association for the purpose of inducing Congress to pass some suitable National Pure Food laws. Among the exhibits is a monster petition in favor of pure food legislation, which is to be sent to Congress. It weighs about one ton and has been signed by hundreds and thousands of citizens in all parts of the country.

NEW MEXICO'S NEW GOVERNOR

Santa Fe, N. M., Jan. 25. The term of Governor Otero having expired the newly appointed successor, Governor Herbert J. Hagerman, of Roswell, N. M. was today sworn in and inaugurated as the head of the territorial administration. Governor Hagerman, who came to New Mexico from Milwaukee, Wis. is considered a man of great ability and integrity and was selected not only because of his executive ability as an account of the fact that he had taken no part in the factional struggle between the political factions of this territory.

MAY RUN FOR CONGRESS

In an interview in the Portland Journal John L. Rand, who is in Portland, is credited with saying that he is still considering running for congress from the Second district. Mr. Rand's friends in Baker City discountenance this report and say that Mr. Rand has decided to come out for re-election to the state senate. They say that he is a strong man for that position and could easily win out.—Baker City Herald.

MILK TALK No. 1.

CHEAP MILK OR MILK CHEAP, WHICH?

Are you buying your milk cheap or are you getting cheap milk? That is the question which every consumer should consider before buying. There are five properties contained in milk, viz: ash, or bone material, casein or curd, butterfat, sugar, and water, in proportion of 3.0% ash, 3.5% casein, 4% butterfat, 5% sugar, 87% water. Now there are 13% solids and 87% water in a 4% milk, that is in milk containing 4% butterfat. This ratio holds good whether of a high or low test, i. e. if you have a milk testing 5% the other solids will be increased in proportion if a 3% they will decrease in like manner. Now the solids are what is, or what should be considered in buying milk, as the water can be had for the pumping. Now let us consider for a moment before we buy whether we are paying a high or low price for these solids. A 3% milk contains 9.75% solids and 90.25% water, a 5% milk contains 16.25% solids and 83.75% water. Now if a 3% milk is worth \$1.50 per quart per month, what should a 5% sell for? Let's see, if we pay \$1.50 for milk containing 9.75% solids, at the same price milk containing 16.25% solids should sell for \$2.50, or you can to every three quarts of 3% milk add two quarts of water, making 5 quarts of 3% milk, i. e. three quarts of 3% milk is equal to five quarts of 5% milk, at the present price 5 quarts of 3% milk @ \$1.50 = \$7.50; three quarts of 5% milk @ \$2.00 = \$6.00, i. e. you are getting the same amount of solids for \$6.00 in a 5% milk that you get in a 3% milk for \$7.50. Are you getting your milk cheap or are you getting cheap milk, which?
