C. KING GETS RARE BIRD.

John D. Rockefeller Adds Sea Eagle to Possessions—Captured Off Nova-Scotia Coast.

To his earthly possessions John D. Rockefeller has added a sea eagle, the American eagle as yet, but a very fine specimen, of cinereous or sea eagle which was captured 150 miles from land by the crew of the tank steamer Excelsior of the Standard Oil company on its voyage from Rotterdam.

It was off the coast of Nova Scotia that the bird, apparently tired out, took refuge in the rigging of the Excelsior, and, though its nature is fierce, readily submitted to capture.

An ornithologist went aboard the ship at Bayonne, and after the eagle had been properly classified as a rare species in these waters, it was caged and sent to Mr. Rockefeller's place at Tarrytown.

The capture of the eagle brought to light a curious bargain that the Standard Oil King has with the masters of all the ships in his service. When a bird is captured at sea it is brought to port, and if pronounced by an ornithologist as worthy of a place in Mr. Rockefeller's collection, it is sent to Pocomtuck Hills where, under the agreement with the captain who made the capture, Mr. Rockefeller keeps it until the bird dies, when it is stuffed and presented to the captain as an ornament for his cabin.

In this way Mr. Rockefeller has gathered a collection of birds from all parts of the world.

FINDS GRAVE HIGH IN AIR.

English Lord's New Book Tells of Strange Burial Place of European Telegraphist.

Lord Ronaldshay's new book on his experiences in distant lands is exciting some comment in London, and certainly for a young man still well under 30 he has something to talk about. Lord Zetland's son and heir has been in more strange places than most men, and a large portion of the fascinating and mysterious east is to him as an open book.

One of the most "weird" of his experiences, to use a favorite word of his own, was when he organized a hunting expedition into the Himalayas and he and his men remained three weeks in altitudes never less than 13,900 feet. They were in constant fear of death from blizzard or avalanche, and depression had settled upon the whole party when quite suddenly they came upon a place where the snow had lately been overturned.

Lord Ronaldshay had it explored and discovered that it was an impromptu grave of a European telegraphist and his native assistant, who had been crushed to death in an avalanche.

MILK TALK No. 1.
CHEAP MILK OR MILK CHEAP, WHICH?
Are you buying your milk cheap or are you getting cheap milk? That is the question which every consumer should consider before buying. There are five properties contained in milk, viz: ash, or bone material, casein or curd, butterfat, sugar, and water, in proportion of 3 of 1% ash, 3.3% casein, 4% butterfat, 5% sugar, 87% water. Now there are 15% solids and 82% water in a 4% milk, that is in milk containing 4% butterfat. This ratio holds good whether of a high or low test, i. e. if you have a milk testing 5% the other solids will be increased in proportion, if a 5% they will decrease in like manner. Now the solids are what is, or what should be considered in buying milk, as the water can be had for the pumping. Now let us consider for a moment before we buy whether we are paying a high or low price for these solids. A 5% milk contains 9.75% solids and 90.25% water, a 5% milk contains 16.25% solids and 83.75% water. Now if a 3% milk is worth \$1.50 per quart per month, what should a 5% sell for? Let's see, if we pay \$1.50 for milk containing 9.75% solids, at the same price milk containing 16.25% solids should sell for \$2.50, or you can add two quarts of 5% milk add two quarts of water, making 8 quarts of 3% milk, i. e. three quarts of 5% milk, i. e. five quarts of 3% milk, at the present price 5 quarts of 3% milk @ \$1.50=\$7.50; three quarts of 5% milk @ \$2.00=\$6.00, i. e. you are getting the same amount of solids for \$6.00 in a 5% milk that you get in a 3% milk for \$7.50. Are you getting your milk cheap or are you getting cheap milk, which?
