CHEAP MILK OR MILK CHEAP, WHICH?

are you getting cheap milk? I hat is the question which every consumer should consider before buying. There are five properties contained in milk, viz; ash, or bone material, caseine or curd, butter-fat sure and sater in contribute. material, caseine or curd, butter-fat, sugar, and water, in proportion of .5 of 1% ash, 5.5% caseine, 4% butterfat, 5% sugar, 87% water. Now there are 15% solids and 87% water in a 4% milk, that is in milk containing 4% butterfat. This ratio holds good wheather of a high or low test, i.e. if you have a milk testing 5% the other solids will be increased in proporportion, if a 5% they will decrease in like manner.
