ENGLAND TO MAKE THE TEST

The Canadian Pacific is shortly to be subjected to a big transportation test by the British government, having in view its new alliance with Japan, in which each nation pledges itself to support the other. The government determined to discover just in what time it could send a considerable body of men from England to the Queen Charlotte Islands, which lie north of Vancouver.

The scheme is to call upon the Canadian Pacific to transport 10,000 marines and sailors with boats and all equipment from England to Vancouver and thence by coasting vessels to Queen Charlotte Islands. This will involve the chartering of extra vessels and the running of twenty trains, each loaded with five hundred men and camp equipment, across the continent. The experiment will take place in about two months.
