MATING

Among the many time honored customs that are now being overhauled and objected to is hazing. This is a relic of barbarism that is found in a greater or less degree among all classes and conditions of men. The members of a class view with distrust all those who would enter it and participate in its privileges and honor and to guard their assumed rights the old members place impediments, tedious and often disagreeable and humiliating initiatory ceremonies to be endured by those who seek to enter its exalted circle.

The senate of the United States hazes new members by imposing silence and a coy demeanor on the part of newly elected members. Communities, cities, villages and neighborhoods haze new comers by a similar exaction and woe betide the "tender foot" who attempts to talk out in their councils about public matters until his probation of meekness has expired. College boys haze by making "plebs" stand on their heads or crawl under tables. The United States senate by imposing silence and communities by placing the new comers in the corners to sweat and get homesick.

SUGAR MAKING AND EATING

The making of sugar in the United States is increasing faster than almost any other industry and there is room for yet farther expansion before enough sugar is made in the United States to supply the people. In the fiscal year ending with June 1905 there were 336,000 long tons of cane sugar made in the United States and 209,722 long tons beet sugar a total of 544,722 long tons. For the same time we imported 1,655,094 long tons of sugar. These figures show that we do not make quite one third of the sugar we consume.

The sugar beet output in the fiscal years 1884-5 was 953 long tons and in 1904-5 it was 209,722 an increase in the 20 years of 208,769 long tons. The increase in the output of cane sugar for the same time was 254,124 long tons. The per capita consumption of sugar in the United States in 1884 was 53.4 pounds, and in 1904 it was 68.7 an increase of consumption in twenty years of 15.3 pounds per capita.

GRAIN SHIPS

The Oregonian of Jan. 29th. gives a list of sixteen ocean going ships en route and listed for Portland for cargoes of grain. These ships have an aggregate tonnage of 29,114. Six of these ships carry the British flag, seven the French flag, two the German and one the Italian flag, but not one the American flag.

On the same day there were eight ships in port loading grain for foreign countries of these, we were British, five French and one Italian and not one American.

The eight foreign ships loading grain to go hence to foreign land had a combined tonnage of 15,686. There was not an American ship in port loading grain for foreign market.

Official figures are available showing the yield of the principal crops of England, Wales and Scotland for the year 1905. The wheat yield shows a liberal increase over the preceding year, yet this is of minor significance in view of the fact that great Britain never produces near enough wheat to satisfy home re-

requirements. Barley, field beans, potatoes, mangolds and hops also record moderate to substantial increases over those of 1904. There is some shrinkage in the hay crop - a fact which should prove of interest to American exporters. Oats are also a little short of last year.

During the fiscal year ended June 30, 1905, the United Kingdom imported 203,900 tons of butter. Of this amount 152,000 tons or 74 per cent came from countries other than British colonial possessions. England buys much of her butter in Denmark. Shipments from that country during the last fiscal year were 85,500 tons, or 40 per cent of total imports into the United Kingdom. Russia furnished 10 per cent, Australia and New Zealand 19 per cent and the United States barely 1 per cent.
