Mitchell was the last deed in a tragic situation which will long be remembered in the National Congress. Senators without dissent agreed to pay the funeral expenses of their associate, the sum being slightly more than \$500.00 Senator Fulton availed himself of this opportunity with mingled sadness and pleasure.

At the time of Senator Mitchell's death Senator Fulton declared that he would introduce legislation in the Senate to honor his memory.

A DRAMATIC TREAT

In no other of his plays has Shakespeare introduced so much genuine fun as in "The Taming of the Shrew." The poet appears to have abandoned himself to a work of unrestrained hilarity, in recognition of the maxim, "a little nonsense now and then is relished by the wisest men." "The Taming of the Shrew" has long been a favorite play with Charles B. Hanford, whose eminence as a representative tragedian is so well established that he can condescend to this unreserved merry mood without loss of dignity. Hanford as Petruchio is one of the stalwart figures of the modern drama. The play is a classic of fun, and he has realized the principal character in a manner which preserves both its humor and dramatic interest. The character of Katherine is one of the most dazzling of Shakespeare's feminine creations and in it Miss Marie Drofnah has won a celebrity which makes her appearance in it an event of great dramatic interest. Mr. Hanford's production of this play is elaborate and complete in every respect. It will be offered at Steward's Grand Opera House, Saturday February 3d.
