**ALFALFA IN UNION COUNTY**  
J. E. Reynolds, the alfalfa king of Union county, was in the city today and stated that he now has two hundred and sixty five acres of alfalfa this year and expects to seed about seventy-five acres more for next season. He will also plow up some of his alfalfa meadow in order to test the benefits to the soil resulting to land from an alfalfa crop. Mr. Reynolds finds the culture of alfalfa profitable and submits the following figures to demonstrate the assertion:  
Off of one forty acre tract, without water, Mr. Reynolds cut two tons the first cutting, one ton the second cutting, and a little better than a half ton the last cutting, making a total of three and a half tons per acre. For the crop Mr. Reynolds received \$7 per ton in the stack. Therefore he received \$24.50 per acre. After taking out the cost of production and estimating a liberal amount of interest on investment, he finds that his net profit was slightly over \$17.50 per acre. Thus he considers that alfalfa is a more profitable crop than wheat at \$1 per bushel. This particular tract from which these figures were compiled has been in alfalfa for three seasons and he expects even better returns from next season's crop. Mr. Reynolds states that he has no fear regarding over-production, as when the time comes when we produce an over plus of alfalfa, the advantages of the Grande Valley as a winter feeding locality will assert themselves and will become known throughout the Northwest.

**FIRE AT PERRY**  
This morning about eleven o'clock fire was discovered in the dry kiln of the Grande Ronde Lumber Company's plant at Perry and before the fire department could get action on the fire the building was one mass of flames. The attention of the firemen was then directed to saving the planing mill which was adjoining. The loss including building and stock will not foot up to more than fifteen hundred dollars. The machinery was not injured.
