AMUSEMENTS

Charles B. Hanford is one of the eminent American players who have had no complaint to offer as to the reception of sincere artistic endeavor by the play going public. His life has been devoted to an earnest and consistent determination to meet the public demand for the best that can be had in a play, cast and scenic equipment. For his author Mr. Hanford has felt that it is useless to attempt to improve upon Shakespeare, and with scant exception his plays have always been those which traditionally figure in the repertory of a Shakespearean star. He has contributed some of the most eminently approved representations that the modern stage has witnessed, and by his extraordinary gifts as a reader has relieved roles which were too often performed with solemn and stilted affectation, or every trace of pedantry. He has effected combinations of stars which permitted productions on a far more elaborate scale than would otherwise have been possible and has maintained his subsequent individual productions on the same high standard then established. He has had the satisfaction of guiding the ambitions of a number of actors who have since found a secure footing in popular approval. Mr. Hanford's most distinguished protégé is Miss Marie Dornah, who in the past few seasons has made her way to a high and permanent place in the affections of playgoers who esteem this womanly woman of the stage. Mr. Frank Hennig is an actor who has for years been a member of Mr. Hanford's company and who during that period has given performance that has won him applause from coast to coast. The date of Mr. Hanford's engagement in this city is, Saturday, Feb. 7 and the play to be presented at Steward's opera house will be "The Taming of the Shrew."

TWO GAME WARDENS

The closed season on ducks, wild geese, and swan commences today and in justice to the hunting public it might be well for them to know that at the present time there are two state deputy game wardens appointed for this county and it is their intention to enforce the law to the letter. These wardens are further backed by the Eastern Oregon Fish and Game Association. These wardens will also prosecute all hunters without license.

BIG MONTANA RANCH DEAL

Lewiston, Mont., Jan. 30.—The largest ranch deal in Fergus County's history, so far as the amount involved is concerned, was a day or two ago, when John Quincy Adams and his brother, of Chicago, Ill., and Spencer, Ia., purchased the Walter Smith, John Shea and N.
